5. On a parcel or packet of patterns or samples addressed to any part of Canada the registration fee is five cents, but this fee must be paid in ordinary postage stamps, the five cent registration stamp being intended for United States letters only. Parcels of pas s or samples to Canada.

8. The registration fees on letters to British Colonies and Foreign Countries will be found in the tables of postage rates.

9. Every letter or packet containing value should have affixed thereto a regis-Certificate of s. Every letter or packet containing value should have amxed thereto a registrated letter stamp, and should be presented to the Postmaster or his clerk for registration and a receipt obtained therefor. On no account should it be dropped into a letter box, as in such cases the rule requiring a receipt to be given by the Postmaster for every registered letter or packet cannot be complied with. posting to be given.

10. Books unless addressed to the United Kingdom, periodicals, newspapers circulars, and other printed matter, cannot be registered unless prepaid the full letter rates, in addition to having attached thereto a registered letter stamp. Books.

11. Registered letters and packets can only be delivered to the parties to whom they are addressed or to their order, and a receipt must be given on the delivery of each registered letter in a book kept by every postmaster for that purpose. Receipt required on delivery. Post office not responsible for loss. 12. It should be clearly understood that registration does not make the Postmaster-General responsible for the contents of agregistered letter or parcel if lost or stolen. The registration simply makes its transmission more secure, by rendering it practicable to trace it, when passing from one place to another in Canada, from its receipt to its delivery; and when addressed from any place in Canada to any place in the United States, the United Kingdom, or parts abroad, if not to its delivery, at least to the frontier or port of despatch.

XV.—Postage Stamps, Post Cards, and Post Bands.

Postage in Canada cannot be paid by British or foreign Stamps. 8. No British stamp, or stamps of a Foreign Country, or Bill, Law, or Registra-and tion Stamp, can be received in prepayment of postage in Canada.

9. Stamps should be affixed to Letters on the right hand upper corner of the face or address side.

10. Instructions in regard to Letters and Books insufficiently prepaid by Postage stamps, will be found in the articles respecting Rates on Letters, and Rates on Books.
