



PROVINCE OF CANADA.

That portion of the Continent of America which is now called Canada, was discovered seven years after the discovery of America, by John & Sebastian Cabot. It subsequently came into the possession of the French, who governed the country by Commanders, Governors, and Presidents, till the year 1759. In that year, under Mr. Pitt's administration, the French territories in America were attacked, and the attempt to conquer Canada was at last successful. It was in this struggle that General Wolfe lost his life, and gained to the British the American Gibraltar—Quebec—which has ever since remained in their possession. On the 8th of September, 1760, the capitulation which transferred Canada from the Gulf of St. Lawrence to the unknown West was signed—the treaty of Paris, by which Canada was formally ceded to the British Crown, was signed on the 10th of Feb., 1763. From the overthrow of the French dominion in Canada to the division of the Province into Upper and Lower sections, the colonist experienced many vicissitudes—many petty quarrels arose between the old French colonists and the new settlers of British origin. In 1774 a new order of things was instituted by the British Government, having for its object the tranquilization of the French and the encouragement of British emigration. In the same year an act was passed by which the limits of the Province were greatly extended, and made to include a large portion of what is now the United States, as far as the Mississippi. All this was lost during the revolutionary war between Britain and her thirteen colonies. During this struggle Canada refused to co-operate with the insurgents. Consequent upon this refusal the revolutionists determined upon a double invasion of Canada, by way of Lake Champlain and the Kennebec river. In 1776 the Province was evacuated, and no further attempt was conceived against Canada. The war between Britain and her colonies was brought to a close in Feb. 20th, 1783, at which time the treaty of Varsilles was signed, recognizing the Independence of that nation. From that time Canada began to prosper, retarded only by the difference of British and French habits, customs, and notions of government, which at last became so serious as to lead to the passing of the "Constitutional act of 1791;" by which act the Province of Quebec was divided into Upper and Lower Canada.

Canada now found herself in possession of the fourth form of government within the short space of thirty-two years. From 1760 to 1763 she was ruled by martial law; from 1773 to 1764 a tyrannical military government prevailed; from 1774 to 1791 a civil government of the most despotic cast was established; and in 1792 a new constitution was introduced, establishing freedom of election and responsibility to the people.

On the 17th of December, 1792, the first Upper Canadian Parliament was convened at Niagara. By an act of this Parliament, (1792) the names of the four Upper Canada Districts were changed into Eastern, Midland, Home, and

Western. An act was also passed for the building of a Gaol and Court House in each of these Districts. The County of Kent, as will be seen in another part of this work, was in the Western District. During the administration of Col. John Graves Simcoe, the first Governor of Upper Canada, an act was passed dividing the Province into nineteen Counties, viz.: Addington, Dundas, Durham, Essex, Frontenac, Glengary, Grenville, Hastings, Kent, Leeds, Lennox, Lincoln, Norfolk, Northumberland, Ontario, Prince Edward, Stormount, Suffolk, and York. Simcoe gave the Thames its name.

The first Upper Canadian Newspaper was established about the year, 1793. From 1792 till the breaking out of the war of 1812, the following Governors, Lieutenant Governors, and Presidents, administered the affairs of the Province.

The second session of the Upper Canadian Parliament was held by the Hon. P. Russell, at York, at that time inhabited by only twelve families. During the administration of Lieut. Governor F. Gore, a bill was passed determining the boundaries of the different Townships, and, also, an act to establish public schools in every district of the Province, (1807.) Four years after this the first census of Upper Canada was taken, when the population amounted to 77,000. In the war of 1812, Major General Brock was killed, and Gen. Roger Sheaffe succeeded to the civil and military command. Canada was evacuated by the Americans on the 5th of November, 1814, and the treaty of Ghent was signed on the 24th of December following; thus, after two years fighting, the war between England and the United States, in which both Upper and Lower Canada gave effectual proofs of their loyalty to them other country, came to an end, without any advantage being gained by either of the contending parties. From 1814 to 1829, the country was agitated by disputes between the Family Compact and the Reformers; it was at this time (1825) that the office of the "Colonial Advocate," owned by W. L. McKenzie, was destroyed by a mob, to whom his conduct had become distasteful. The struggle between the Tories and Reformers at last resulted in the unfortunate rebellion of 1837. On the 23rd of July, 1840, the Union Bill, passed by both Houses the January previous, received the sanction of the Queen, and came into operation on the 10th of February, 1841. The history of Canada, from the re-union of the Provinces to the present time, is marked by many improvements and events that are fresh in the memory of all—and need not be here repeated. The following tribute to Canada, by a Canadian M. P. P., who wrote in 1824, is worthy of perusal.

"We have only to cast our eyes transiently over the map of North America to be immediately assured of the singularly advantageous situation of the settled parts of Upper Canada. Seated like a gem in the bosom of a country that is

neither scorched by the sultry summer of the South, nor blasted by the tardy, bitter, biting winters of the North; surrounded by the most magnificent lakes, and possessing the most extensive internal navigation in the known world, it would be difficult, perhaps impossible, to find in any other region of the globe, a tract of country of the same magnitude with so many natural advantages, as that part of Upper Canada which lies between the Lakes, Ontario, Erie and Huron, and the Ottawas or Grand River, nine-tenths of the whole extent which are calculated for almost every description of agricultural labor, with such a prospect of success as, perhaps, no other part of this continent could realize. A part of this tract of country, commencing in the neighborhood of Kingston, and running westward nearly five hundred miles, to the Sandwich frontier, by a depth northward of from forty to one hundred miles, is alone capable of supplying all Europe with grain of every description; besides being rich in cattle.

Much has been said at a distance, against the climate of this fine country. Those, however, who have removed to it from Great Britain, are agreeably disappointed in finding it most pleasant. It might be said with no great impropriety that the present inhabitants of Canada have but two seasons, summer and winter; for winter has no sooner disappeared, which generally happens by the middle of April, than the whole animal and vegetable creation starts into renewed life with a rapidity and vigor that leaves the season of spring with such doubtful limits as to be scarcely perceptible, or deserving a specific character; again, in the fall of the year, the months of September and October are generally so fine and summer-like, and these being succeeded by what is so aptly termed the Indian summer, in November, (that men) that we should have great difficulty, were it not for an artificial calendar, in saying when in was autumn."

With a view to show the increase in the population of Upper Canada, from the beginning of the present century, we submit the following calculations:—
 1800, 57,738; 1810, 73,492; 1820, 119,645; 1825, 158,027; 1830, 221,567;
 1835, 346,165; 1840, 437,441; 1842, 486,055; 1848, 723,332; 1850, 791,420;
 1852, 950,330; 1861, 1,396,091. The estimated population in 1864, assuming the same rate of increase as between 1852 and 1861, would be 1,586,150.

It will thus be seen that the natural advantages possessed by Canada, have a steadily increasing population to develop them. Having an area of 121,260 square miles, with thousands of acres of valuable lands yet unsurveyed on its Northern and Western boundaries with Municipal, Political, and Educational Institutions, second to those of no other country in the world; we may certainly predict a bright future for our country.

With a view to exhibit the progress made by Upper Canada, we give the following statistics: Upper Canada had, in 1851, 99,906 occupiers of land. They numbered, in 1861, 131,983. It produced, in 1851, 12,682,550 bushels of wheat; 11,391,867 of oats; 9,982,186 of potatoes; 3,110,118 of turnips; of flax or hemp, 59,680 lbs.; 3,669,874 lbs. of maple sugar. Its produce of these articles was, in 1861—wheat, 24,260,425 bushels; oats, 21,220,874;

potatoes, 15,325,920; turnips, 18,206,959; flax or hemp, 1,225,934 lbs.; maple sugar, 6, 370,605 lbs. The value of the live stock in Upper Canada was, in 1861, as much as \$53,227,486; its agricultural implements, \$11,280,347; its farms, \$295,162,315.

In 1808, the value of the entire trade of Canada was about \$8,400,000. The value reached, in 1852—exports, \$14,055,973; imports, \$20,286,493; total, \$34,342,466. In 1861, its imports amounted to \$36,614,195; exports, \$43,046,823; total, \$79,661,013. The value of the trade with the United States alone was, in the last of these years, \$35,455,815; the imports from that country reaching \$21,069,388, and the imports to it \$14,386,427.

In 1851, the net revenue yielded by the customs was \$2,808,831; in 1861, \$4,411,160. The value of books imported was, in 1850, \$243,580; in 1861, \$5,056,943.

On roads, navigation, and railroads, the Province has expended as much as \$60,000,000, over and above the interest in the latter of parties out of the country. There are in use at this moment between 1,800 and 1,900 miles of railway; besides 3,422 of electric telegraph, belonging to the Montreal Telegraph Company, which had, in 1861, a capital stock of \$400,000 (to whom it had advanced from \$60,000, in 1747,) employed 400 persons (35 in 1847,) and conveyed 300,000 messages; the number conveyed in 1847 having been 33,000.

Our post offices have multiplied from 3, in 1766, to 69, in 1824; 601, in 1850, and 1,698 in 1860. The number of miles of established post roads was, in the first of these years, 170; in the second, 1992; in the third, 7,595; and in the last, 14, 202. The miles travelled were, in 1824, 369; in 1766, 616; in 1851, 2,287,000; in 1860, 5,712,000. In 1852, 3,700,000 letters were transmitted; in 1860, 9,000,000. The expenditure of the Post Office was, in the former of these years, \$276,191, and its revenue \$230,629; in the latter, its expenditure was \$534,681, and its revenue \$658,451. One hundred and ten thousand dollars additional is paid per annum, by way of subsidy, to railroads; and four hundred and sixteen thousand to steamships.

The population of United Canada numbered in the year 1800, 240,000. It was in 1825, 581,920; by 1851 it had reached 1,842,265. In 1861, it amounted to 2,506,755. The advance in Upper Canada between 1825 and 1861 has been from 581,027 to 1,396,091—not much less than 800 per cent. in 36 years.

In 1831, the number of cultivated acres in the whole of Canada, Upper and Lower, was 2,884,345. It came up, in 1844, to 4,968,408; and in 1851, to 7,300,837.

COUNTY OF KENT GAZETTEER AND GENERAL DIRECTORY, FOR 1864-5.

COUNTY OF KENT, PROVINCE OF CANADA.

This County is bounded on the north by Lambton; on the east by Elgin; on the South by Lake Erie, and on the West by Essex and Lake St. Clair. It contains eleven Municipalities, viz.: the Town of Chatham, and the Townships of Camden, Chatham, Dover, East and West, Harwich, Howard, Orford, Raleigh, Romney, Tilbury East, and Zone; the Townships of Dover, East, Chatham, Camden, and Zone border upon the County of Lambton; Orford borders upon Elgin; Orford, Howard, Harwich, Raleigh, and Romney are on Lake Erie; Romney and East Tilbury join Essex to the West, and East Dover borders upon Lake St. Clair. There are no interior Townships.

The County of Kent along with Lambton and Essex, formed what was once called the Western District, which was thus described in 1796 by Surveyor-General Smith: "It is bounded southerly by Lake Erie, easterly by a meridian passing through the extremity of Long Point, and comprehends all the lands north westerly of these boundaries not included within the bounds of the Hudson Bay Company or the territory of the United States." The other Districts were the Home, Midland and Eastern. By the British act 31, Gen. 3, chap. 31, (1791) it was provided that the Governor General of Upper Canada might divide the province into as many Counties or districts as he liked. Col. Jno. Graves Simcoe, (the first Governor of Upper Canada,) in 1792, in accordance with such authority, issued his proclamation dividing Canada into nineteen counties, viz:—Addington, Dundas, Durham, Essex, Frontenac, Glengary, Grenville, Hastings, Kent, Leeds, Lennox, Lincoln, Norfolk, Northumberland, Ontario, Prince Edward, Stormont, Suffolk and York. Districts having, in 1849, by Art. 12 V. cap. 78 (which came in force on the first of January 1850) been abolished, and counties erected in their stead, certain counties to remain united till the junior county should attain a population of not less than fifteen thousand souls, in which case it became entitled to a separate establishment

of courts and county institutions. Kent and Lambton were so united, Lambton being the junior county, but from its geographical position it was deemed expedient to make provision for its separation before it attained the population required by law to entitle to sever it the judicial union between it and the county of Kent. Accordingly in the year 1851, an act was passed authorizing such a separation, and establishing separate courts, &c. This part of Canada commenced settling about the year 1784. The date of the settlement of the several Townships that then formed the County of Kent are as follows, viz.: Raleigh, 1792; Dover, Chatham, Camden West, Harwich, Howard, and Orford, 1794.

The principal river in the County is the Thames, or "La Tranche," which enters at the South East corner of the Township of Zone; it then runs along between Zone and Orford, Campden West and Howard, Chatham and Harwich, and enters Lake St. Clair, between Dover on the North, and Raleigh and Tilbury, on the South. It is navigable.

The Thames receives a number of smaller streams in its course, at Chatham it is joined by McGregor's creek. It passes through some of the finest farming lands in the County. The land adjoining it in the County of Kent is mostly level, rich, and noted for its superior growth of wheat. Many of the farms have been settled for over seventy years, and are in the highest state of cultivation. The surface of the County is rolling or gently undulating, and irrigated by numerous creeks and streams, whose fertilizing influence adapt the soil to the cultivation of crops of every description. The County was heavily timbered, but during the long time that has elapsed since its settlement, the most valuable portion of the maple, black walnut, elm, oak, and beech has been cut; exported or manufactured. A description of the soil, streams, &c., will appear over each Township, as also some interesting statistics that exhibit the general progress made by the County.

Below we give the number of acres of land taken up, and under cultivation, with the population, and the value of rateable property in 1846, which, compared with 1861, is sufficient to show that the County of Kent has made such progress as must be at once gratifying to its early settlers and brave pioneers, and encouraging to those who may purpose making it their future home.

As this work is chiefly designed as a record of statistical and general information, we deem it superfluous to enter at any length into a history of Kent, although many interesting events have transpired within its limits. Here, on the 5th of October, 1813, was fought the battle between the British and Indian forces under General Proctor, and the celebrated Indian Chief, Tecumseh, and the American army under General Harrison. Its early settlement, and the efforts made to civilize and christianize the Indians who settled in this section, as early as 1729; also the perseverance and energy of its first settlers, along with the march of improvement, affords ample material to render an historic sketch, both interesting and instructive. An impetus was given to the progress of the County on the completion of the Great Western Railway, which, along with the roads that intersect the County in every direction, opened communication with the County town, and afforded a cheap and expeditious means of transporting the industrial and agricultural productions of the County, and enhanced the value of property to a great extent. At the commencement of the settlement of the County, Lots of 200 acres, situated on the Banks of the Thames, were sold for \$100; in 1804, they sold for \$500. Since that time, the price of property has been rapidly increasing. The development of the rich agricultural resources of the County was the means of starting many now thriving villages, which contains their share of manufacturers, merchants, mechanics, &c. A description of the Town of Chatham and the Villages of the County will be found in other parts of this work.

EDUCATIONAL.

In the very important matter of education, great progress has been effected in the County of Kent, and she has now the advantages of a liberal and permanent provision for the general and thorough education of her rising population, fully enjoying the privileges and benefits conferred by the excellent School Act for Upper Canada (13th and 14th Vic. cap. 48, 1850). The reports of the Local Superintendents of Schools for the County, in general indicate a growing interest in the subject of education, and a steady progress in the different Sections and Townships, that is highly satisfactory. Each Township is divided into School Sections of a suitable extent for one School; and in each of these Sections three Trustees are elected to manage its School affairs. Each School and Municipal Corporation, desirous of establishing Free Public Libraries, is aided by the Educational Department granting 100 per cent. on local appropriations, and supplying books from the Depository in connexion with the Department.

GRAMMAR SCHOOLS.—Each of these Schools (which form the intermediate link between the Common Schools and the Universities) is managed by a Board of Trustees appointed by the County Council. There is one Grammar School in each County Town, which receives at least \$400 per annum from the government, and where the funds will admit of it, others may be established in different parts of the County.

There is a good Grammar School in Chatham, with an average attendance of 71 pupils. Altogether, an excellent and well-organized system of Schools and Churches has been planted amongst the settlers, and such as had been the blessing of their earlier days, and the pride of their fathers. The following is a report of the School Statistics of the County.

COMMON SCHOOLS—I. TABLE A. RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURE OF COMMON SCHOOL MONEYS FOR THE YEAR 1862.

RECEIPTS.

1. The amount appropriated and paid by the Department of Public Instruction from the Legislative Grant, for salaries of teachers was, in the County, \$3089.75; in the town of Chatham, \$518.

2. The amount apportioned and paid for the purchase of maps, apparatus, prizes and libraries, being in proportion and equal to the amount expended from local sources was, for the County, \$85.00; in the town of Chatham, \$40.

3. The law requires that each municipality shall provide a sum by assessment at least equal to the Legislative Grant, but each municipality can provide as large an additional sum as it may think proper for school purposes. The amount provided by municipal assessment was, for the County, \$2999.00; in the town of Chatham, \$2500.00.

4. As the council in the municipality, so the trustees in a school section, have authority to provide money for the support of their school or schools, by assessment, and also by fees on pupils, unless the rate-payers decide in favor of a free school. The amount of assessment levied by trustees in addition to the levy by the municipal councils was \$16,989.00 for the County; for the town of Chatham, \$333.30.

5. Rate-bill fees on pupils are only imposed where the schools are not free. The amount of rate-bills imposed was \$725.19 for the County; for the town of Chatham, \$32.50.

6. The amount received by trustees from the Clergy Reserve Fund and other sources, and appropriated for the County was \$2,156.52; for the town of Chatham, \$1,237.76.

7. The amount available in 1862, from the balances of 1861 was, for the County, \$2,365.32; for the town of Chatham, \$132.70.

8. The total receipts for common school purposes for the year 1861, in the County were \$2,8216.83; in the town of Chatham, \$5,983.26.

EXPENDITURE.

9. The amount paid for the Salaries of Teachers was, in the County, \$20,236.56; town of Chatham, \$3,484.61.

10. The amount expended in the purchase of maps, apparatus, prize-books, and libraries was, for the County, \$480.87; town of Chatham, \$106.00.

11. The amount expended for school-books, stationery, fuel, and other expenses was, for the County, \$1,730.65; town of Chatham, \$245.57.

12. The amount expended for the purchase of school-sites, and the erection of school-houses was, for the county, \$2704.09.
13. The amount paid for the rents and repairs of school-houses was, for the County, \$792.97; town of Chatham, \$208.41.
14. Unexpended balances of the preceding years were, for the County, \$2465.60; town of Chatham, \$1938.47. These balances are rather apparent than real. Arising from the fact that many of the Municipal Councils and Trustees, do not until after the close of the civil year, collect the sums necessary to pay the expenses of such year.
15. The total expenditure in behalf of the common schools, was, in the County, \$25,945 74; Chatham, \$4,044 59.

II. TABLE B. SCHOOL POPULATION—PUPILS ATTENDING COMMON SCHOOLS.

An act still unrepealed, requires the legal returns of school population to include only school children, between the ages of 5 and 16 years; but the law secures to all persons from 5 to 21 years of age, the right of attending the schools, as long as their conduct conforms to its rules and discipline.

1. The school population (including only the children between 5 and 16 years of age) was, in the County of Kent, 7,554; in the town of Chatham, 1,100.
2. The number of pupils attending the schools, from 5 to 16 years of age, was, in the County, 5,851; Chatham, 807. The pupils of other ages, attending the schools, was, in the County, 406; Chatham, 23. The whole number of pupils attending school was, in the County, 6,257; Chatham, 830.
3. The number of boys in the schools, was, in the County, 3,326; Chatham, 45.
4. The number of girls in the schools, was, in the County, 3,011; Chatham, 373. The number returned as indigent children, was, in the County, 15; Chatham, 60.
5. The same table shews the periods of attendance of pupils at schools, and the subjects of their studies, from which it is seen, that the average attendance, was, in the County, 2,069; Chatham, 363. The number of children in the County, whose attendance was not reported is 0, and the number in the County, not attending any school whatever was, 1,689. The different branches of instruction taught, are, reading, arithmetic, grammar, general and Canadian geography, history, writing, book-keeping, mensuration, algebra, geometry, natural philosophy, vocal music, linear drawing, needle-work, and other studies.

It appears that there were 70 pupils in the different branches of English; in Latin, 34; in Greek, 8; in French, 24; in mathematics, 49; in history, 62; in geography, 52; in physical science, 20.

The various text books used and read in the school are Lennie's English Grammar, Edinburgh Academy Latin Grammar, with other Latin text books; Arnold's and Anthon's Greek Grammars, and Xenophon Reading Book, French Grammar and Reading book; in arithmetic, Irish national and Sangster's national, with Algebra; Euclid, geography and history, text and reading books.

TOWNSHIP OF ROMNEY.

This Township is bounded on the North by East Tilbury; on the South-East by Lake Erie; and on the West by Mersea. It is a small Township of triangular shape, with its base towards Lake Erie. The soil is a clayey loam—gravelly upon the ridges. It is well watered by the Yellow Creek; in the Western part there are other streams that water the Township in all directions. The timber consists of maple, oak, beech, hickory, elm, black walnut, and a small portion of cedar on the border of the Lake. In 1845 it contained only 237 inhabitants, and there were only 975 acres under cultivation.

TOWNSHIP OF HOWARD.

This Township is bounded on the North by the river Thames; on the South West by the Township of Harwich; on the North-East by the Township of Orford; and on the South by Lake Erie. It is well watered—the principal streams are McGregor's Creek, and Big Creek. The soil of the Township is mostly a fine, light loam, intersected with gravel. Considerable quantities of tobacco were raised in the Township at one time—the number of pounds in 1850, was 24,490. Howard is very well settled, and contains many well cultivated farms. TOWNSHIP OF DOVER, EAST AND WEST.

This Township is of triangular shape, and is bounded on the North-East by the Township of Chatham; on the South by the river Thames; and on the West by Lake St. Clair. Considerable quantities of the land in the Township is open prairie, well adapted for grazing. The soil of the remainder is rich and well adapted for the raising of crops of every description. The population in 1846 was 1,242, and the value of rateable property \$40,044. There were only 2,432 acres under cultivation in the same year. Its population, in 1850, was 1598. TOWNSHIP OF ORFORD.

This Township is bounded on the North East by the Township of Alborough, on the North West by the river Thames, on the South West by Howard, and on the South East by Lake Erie. The soil of the Township is of excellent quality, and well timbered with maple, oak, beech, elm, &c. Considerable quantities of staves and square timber are annually manufactured in Orford. Tobacco was formerly grown in the Township, but its cultivation has been discontinued to some extent, owing to the uncertainty of the crop and the diminution of import duty; which afforded greater facilities for American dealers to send the article into this country. The population of Orford in 1850 was 2,465. The progress made by the Township will be seen by the following extracts from the census report of 1861.
