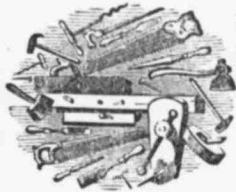

PALMERSTON.—Incorporated a Town by Act of Parliament, December, 1874, formerly in the Township of Wallace, County of Perth, but at time of incorporation was taken into Township of Minto, County of Wellington. Palmerston is the junction of the Kincardine branch of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway, main line terminus of which is Southampton, on Lake Huron. Thus forming direct line for Lake Superior Boats, which call twice a week at both Southampton and Kincardine. The G. W. R. Company are about erecting a new station house, building an addition to engine shops so as to hold 12 engines, and extending switches, to hold 150 cars, it is expected these improvements will cost upwards of Twenty Thousand dollars, and when completed will add very materially to the appearance of the Town, a by-law is about being submitted to the ratepayers for the raising of \$5,000 for improvements throughout the Town. The corporation also offer a bonus of \$5,000 to any manufacturer settling in the place. Few places, if any in Canada can boast of such

rapid prosperity as Palmerston, only four years ago the ground where the Town now stands was a wilderness, the first house was built in 1871 by Wm. Thomson, and now the Town has a population of 1,500 and is rapidly increasing, principal exports are: timber, ties, staves, barrel headings, grain and cattle. It is distant from Toronto, 91 miles; from Southampton, 59 miles; and from Guelph, the County Town, 43 miles.

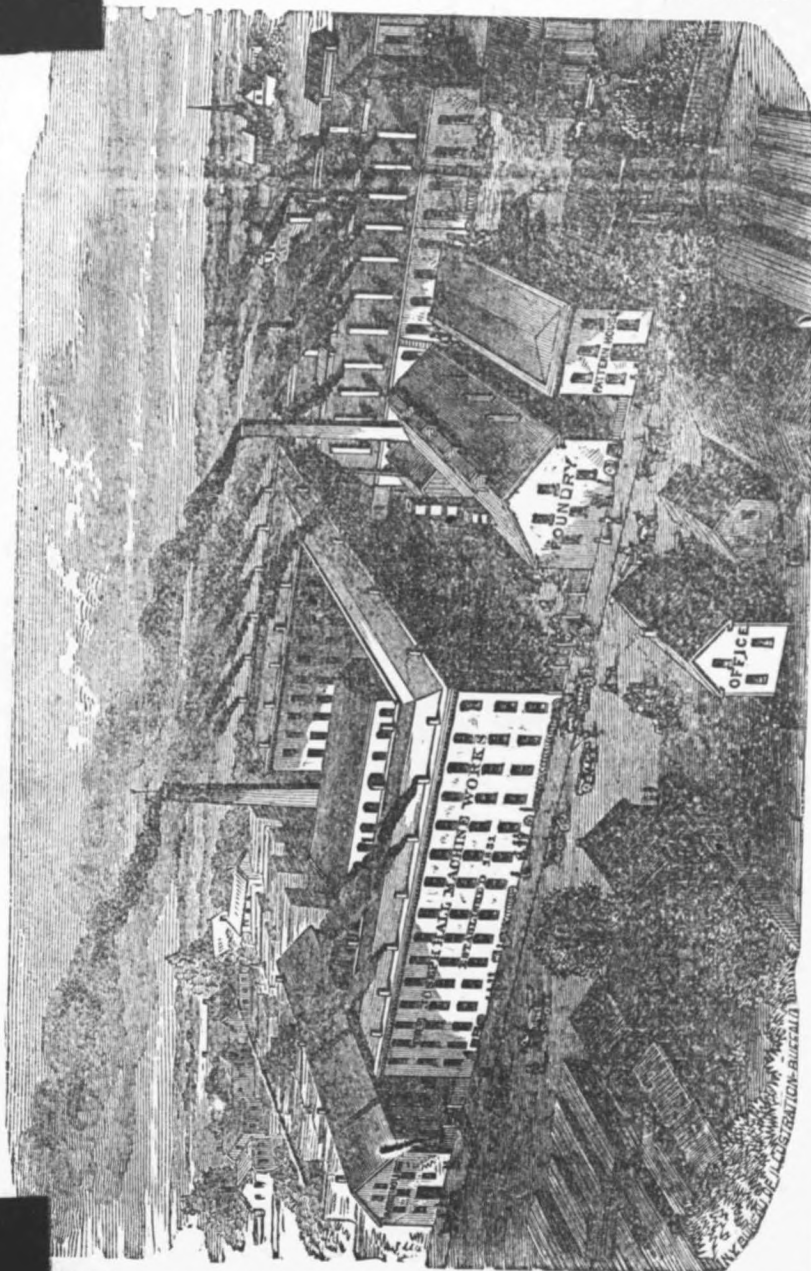

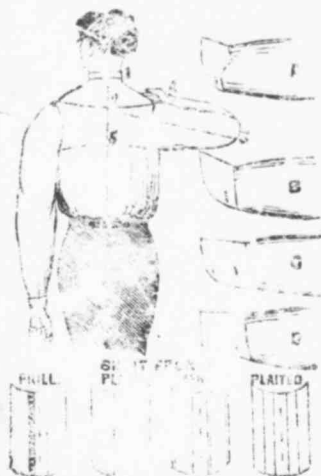
