F U L L A R T O N .

This village is situated on the River Thames, and on the Mitchell Road to St. Mary's, in the Township of Fullarton, six miles from Mitchell and twelve from St. Mary's. It was first settled by James Woodley in 1843. Mr. Woodley sold the first lot in 1852, and the post office was established in 1853. The village now contains two general stores, one tavern, one tannery, two shoe shops, two blacksmith shops, a wagon shop, tailors, carpenters and other mechanics. Mails are received tri-weekly,

viz :—Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays. There are three Churches, Wesleyan Methodist, built in 1861, and cost \$1000—Rev'd Mr. Dyer, minister; the Bible Christian Church, erected in 1855, of frame, cost \$700. Rev. Thomas Green, pastor, and the Baptist Church, erected in 1866 of frame, cost \$600—no resident pastor at present. There is a good School in the Village with an average attendance of 140 pupils,—Principal Robt. Sansburn; Assistant, Andrew McCulloch. Population 200.

LISTOWEL.

An incorporated village situated on the town line of the Townships of Wallace and Elma on the Maitland River, 33 miles from Stratford and 22 from Mitchell. The village contains five churches; the Church of England, a handsome frame, 30 x 45 feet, erected in 1863 at a cost of \$1,000. Rev. A. E. Miller, Incumbent. The Canada Presbyterian, is a frame building of imposing appearance, 40 x 50 feet, erected in 1868 and cost \$2,500. It is seated for 350 persons. This congregation was first organized in 1862, under the labors of Rev. Mr. Henwick, and worshipped in the Congregational Church until the present Church edifice was erected. In 1868, the Rev. G. W. Bell entered on this charge as Minister. The Wesleyan Methodist and the Congregational and Methodist Episcopal Churches are each good frame buildings. The Common School is a substantial frame building, divided into three departments, where over 300 pupils receive instruction under the charge of Mr. B. Rothwell, assisted by the Misses Findlay and Climie.

This village possesses superior advantages for manufactures, among which may be found the largest tannery in this section of the country, carried on by Messrs Towner & Campbell. Their buildings are frame and are 282 feet long by 32 feet wide, two stories high, where they use a 25 horse-power engine, and employ 10 hands in the manufacture of Spanish sole leather only.

The foundry of Turnbull & Lockie, the grist saw-mills of Climie, Bellingher & Co., and the extensive Woolen mills of Herman & Bolton, who manufacture tweeds, full cloths, blankets and flannels of all kinds at the rate of 100 yds. per diem, besides carding 55,000 lbs. spinning 4,000 lbs., and dressing 900 pieces of cloth annually. A large business is done by them in custom work. The works were established in 1867. The buildings are frame, 40 x 70 feet, two stories high. A 14 horse-power engine is used, and 15 to 20 hands employed.

The large Cabinet factory of Messrs. Hess & Co. was established in 1866. The building is frame, 100 x 40 feet, two stories high, where a 12 horse-power engine is used, and 18 to 20 hands employed in making furniture and cabinet ware and undertaking.

Messrs. Dawson & Little's carriage factory is situated on Main street, and was established in 1866. This firm employs 10 hands in the manufacture of carriages, wagons, buggies, sleighs, cutters and harrows, with blacksmithing in all its branches.

Messrs. George Maynard and James Mitchell have a two story frame building, 24 x 48 feet, where they make wagons, &c., and 300 superior grain cradles annually.

NEWSPAPERS.—The Listowel *Banner* is a good weekly, published by Mr. Joseph H. Hacking, at the subscription price of \$1.50 per annum. It has a large circulation in the Counties of Perth, Huron and Waterloo.

The mercantile interests are well represented.

Among the five hotels of this village, the "Commercial Hotel and general stage office," is kept by Mr. George Rodemich in first-class style for the accommodation of commercial travellers and the public generally. The others are also worthy of public patronage.

MILLBANK.

The village of Millbank, Township of Mornington, is pleasantly situated on a tributary, (branch or creek,) of the Grand River. It is 17 miles distant from Stratford, with which it is connected by a very excellent gravel road, under the control of the County Council. The distance to Berlin is twenty-two miles. There is a stage carrying a mail from Stratford on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays; and one daily from Berlin, connecting with the morning mail from Toronto. The stream furnishes sufficient water-power to drive a large flour and saw mill. There is a steam Carding Mill and a steam Foundry.

The Presbyterians, who constitute the majority of the Township, have one of their churches here—a frame building capable of seating 300 persons. The Congregation was organized about 12 years ago and chose for their first pastor the Rev. G. McMullen, now of Woodstock. He was succeeded by the Rev. D. Beattie. The Congregation—at present in charge of the Rev. J. Edgar Croly., B. A.—have this year erected a handsome manse at a cost of about \$2000 and have a glebe of 15 acres.

The Church of England possesses a neat brick church, seating 200, and a frame manse at present occupied by the Rev. Wm. Logan, who conducts service also at Crosshill and Elma.

The Wesleyan Methodists have a frame church holding about 150 persons, and have for their pastor the Rev. J. Hough.

The School Section have erected a very fine School House and always employ the best teachers; the present teacher, Mr. Wm. Alexander, receiving a salary of \$500 per annum.

The residence of Dr. James Johnson, situated on the corner of the Stratford road is the finest in the village. Population 300.

MITCHELL.

Is an important village and station on the Buffalo and Goderich section of the Grand Trunk Railway, thirty two miles from Goderich and twelve miles from Stratford, the County Town. This village was incorporated in 1857. From that time the progress of the village has been rapid. The number on the Assessment Roll now is over 300 and the assessed value of real and personal property is \$271,000. It contains several good Churches. The Church of England a good frame building with spire and dome. Rev. H. Caulfield, Incumbent.

The Roman Catholic Church is a frame.

The Canada Presbyterian Church is a handsome frame of cruciform shape, the main building is 40×30, the transept is 60×30. It was erected in 1857 and improved in 1868, the total cost of the church being \$2,500, having capacity to seat 400. This is the only Presbyterian Church in the place; the Congregation is large. The present Minister is the Rev. J. W. Mitchell.

The Wesleyan Methodist Church is built of white brick with cut stone dressings. It is 75×40—20 feet high with tower and an octagonal gilt spire with bell and vane. The church was erected in 1867 at a cost of \$6,000. Up to that time this was a Mission Station, since then it is an Independent Circuit and has sustained all the institutions connected with the church in a creditable and praise-worthy manner. In connection with this church is a very fine brick parsonage which is not excelled by any in the County. Rev. W. R. Dyer, Minister.

Messrs. A. & J. Mulheron are largely engaged in the manufacture of all kinds of Agricultural Implements, Stoves, Castings, &c. They employ ten hands and an engine of twelve horse power to propel their machinery. The works have been established during the present season. The buildings are frame.

FLOUR MILLS.—The large Flour Mills owned and carried on by Mr. F. Hollands were lately destroyed by fire, but are about to be re-built the present year. Mr. Hollands had expended over \$10,000 in the improvement of the mill, reservoir and surrounding grounds shortly before his great loss.

Mr. J. T. Atkinson's Mill is frame 80 × 40—three stories high, with two run of stone. This mill can dress and pack fifty barrels of flour daily, the custom work averages 100 bushels per diem.

Mr. Wm. Small's Grist Mill was erected in 1868, and is a large substantial frame with two run of stone—his custom work is about 90 bushels daily.

Mr. Walter Thomson's Oatmeal, Split Peas and Pot Barley Mills are frame, 76 × 50—three stories, with two run of stone—steam power to the extent of twenty horse is used. Mr. Thomson is altogether in the merchant trade.

CARRIAGE MAKING, &c.—Mr. Edward Stiles' Carriage Factory on Ontario Street was established in 1860. Eighteen hands are employed by him, and he carries on all the various branches in the line; his buildings are frame, 26 × 50 and brick 68 × 24, with show room 90 × 26 feet.

Mr. James Begg's Carriage and Agricultural Implement Works were established in 1861; the buildings are frame, 114 × 26 feet. Fourteen hands are employed and wagons and agricultural implements of all kinds made to order.

Mr. Wm. Honey is engaged in the same line; his buildings are frame, 20 × 50 feet, with four forges. Five hands are employed and wagons, sleighs, cultivators, harrows, &c., are manufactured, and general blacksmithing carried on.

Mr. David Morton's Steam Saw Mill is frame, 30 × 50 feet, and was erected in 1850. It has the capacity to saw about one million feet of lumber annually.

He manufactures all kinds of cabinet ware, and was awarded the first prize on fancy veneering at the Provincial Exhibition of 1868. Four hands are employed by him.

Messrs. Armstrong & Son, proprietors Monckton carriage factory.—The building is frame, 50 x 30 feet, two stories high. Four hands are employed, and a six horse-power engine used. They manufacture carriages, wagons, sleighs, cutters and agricultural implements, and execute general blacksmithing in all its branches.

SEBRINGVILLE.

A post village and station on the Buffalo and Goderich section of the Grand Trunk Railway, five miles from Stratford the County Town, seven from Mitchell and forty from Goderich. The village contains one church—the "Evangelical Association," built of Brantford white brick in 1869, and cost \$5,000. The building is 38×60 feet, with tower and dome of plain Gothic style of architecture and seated for 350 persons. The basement story is used for Sabbath School and Lecture Room. This Congregation was organized about 1844. The Rev. Peter Alles, Minister.

FLOUR MILLS.—Messrs. Hill & Brother's Flour and Grist Mill is built of brick 36×50, 2½ stories high with three run of stone; they use steam and water power combined; employ four hands and can dress and pack 75 barrels of flour and grind 200 bushels of custom work daily. This firm has also a large stave and heading factory giving employment to 10 men.

Mr. A. Gettler's Flour and Grist Mill is built of brick 40×55 feet, three stories high with three run of stone. It is capable of dressing and packing 90 barrels of flour and 150 bushels of custom work daily, using steam power only.

TANNERIES.—In this branch of business, the tannery of Messrs. Eby & Moritz claims a notice. It was established in 1869; the building is frame containing twelve large vats; the power is steam—they tan upper and harness leather, kipp, calf and sheep skins.

In the mechanical pursuits, Messrs. R. B. Johns & Co., are engaged in manufacturing carriages, wagons, sleighs, cutters and agricultural implements. They make and sell the celebrated "Anderson and Johnston's patent Hay Rake." Blacksmithing in all its branches is carried on by the firm.

There are three hotels. The Sebringville Hotel is kept by Mrs. Pigeon in first-class style for the accommodation of guests and the public generally. There are two good stores, a post office, two saddler and two blacksmith shops.

The common school is a handsome building erected in 1864, at a cost of \$3000, where 150 pupils are educated by Miss Jane Elder.

The chief shipments here per Railway are lumber, flour, liquors, bark, live stock, &c. John G. King, Station Master. Mails daily. Population 250.

ST. MARY'S.

This fine town is located in the south-east part of the Township of Blanchard, upon the north branch of the River Thames; at its confluence with Trout Creek, and at the Junction of the London branch of the Grand Trunk Railway, with the Sarnia or Main line; twenty-one miles from London, seventy miles from Sarnia, and ninety-nine miles from Toronto. A portion of the land on which the town is now built, originally comprised four hundred acres, formerly owned by the Canada Company. Two hundred acres of which, (with the mill privilege), were purchased from the Canada Company, by the late Thomas Ingersoll, second son of the late Major Ingersoll, of Ingersoll, in the County of Oxford. The remaining two hundred acres, were bought by his brother, James Ingersoll, Esq., the present Registrar of the County of Oxford, at Woodstock.

St. Mary's was incorporated as a village, in January, 1855, under proclamation, made September 21st, 1853.

The place was called "Little Falis," until 1852, for the reason that the River Thames at its confluence with Trout Creek, in almost the heart of the town, flowed over a lime-stone bottom, and formed a little cataract, having a fall of about four feet. This fall is now very much reduced, by the quarrying of stone from the bed of the river.

The present name St. Mary's, was then given it, in honor of the wife of the late Thomas Mercer Jones, Commissioner for the Canada Company, at Goderich; she having donated fifty dollars toward the erection of the first school house in the village. Thomas Ingersoll settled here in 1840; and in connection with his brother, Colonel James Ingersoll, erected a saw-mill, the same year; and in the following year, a grist mill; the old grist-mill has greatly enlarged, and is now one of the largest flouring mills in this section of the country. It is owned and carried on by William Veal Hutton, Esq. In 1841, James Ingersoll purchased his brother's interest in the mills and lands, then held between them.

This is an important station, being the headquarters of the Engineering Department between Toronto and Sarnia, all the carpenter work and blacksmithing for that section of the Road being done here, with a large engine shed for the Locomotive Department. About 100 men are employed in the various branches connected with the working of the Road, whose monthly wages amount to over four thousand dollars. Two magnificent

viaducts, one on the main line to Sarnia and the other on the London Branch span the River Thames and the Trout Creek at this place, which in point of size and workmanship are second only to the far famed Victoria Bridge at Montreal.

FLOURING MILLS.—St. Mary's Mill, W. V. Hutton, proprietor, Queen street; built of stone, 46 by 66 feet, four stories high, four run of stone.

MOORE'S STEAM FLOURING AND GRIST MILLS.—John Moore & Sons, proprietors, Wellington street; built of stone and frame, 30 by 50 feet, four stories high, with four run of stone. The engine is forty horse-power and the machinery of the best kind.

Geo. White & Co's flour and oatmeal mill is built of frame, 40 by 60 feet, three stories high, with three run of stone. Merchant flouring and gristing is done, and oatmeal manufactured in large quantities.

IRON FOUNDRIES.—W. & T. Haggert, Queen street, employ about 40 hands, and an engine of fourteen horse-power. They manufacture agricultural implements, threshing machines, reapers and mowers, separators, ploughs, cultivators, scufflers, drills, stoves, &c., to the value of over thirty thousand dollars annually.

John Moore & Sons, founders and agricultural implements manufacturers. This is the oldest establishment in St. Mary's, and was established in 1852. The shop is 136 feet by 33, with two wings attached. Reapers, mowers, threshing machines, separators, mill gearing, stoves and general job work. Steam power is used, and about thirty hands employed.

WOOLLEN FACTORIES.—John Illingworth's mills are frame, 80 by 50 feet, two stories high. Water and steam power; employs seven hands; manufactures tweeds and flannels, besides attending to a large custom business.

HARRISON'S MILLS.—John Harrison, steam power; employs 15 hands; capacity to manufacture 37,000 yards of cloth annually, in addition to a large custom, carding and fulling business.

ALEX. ROBERTSON'S flax-mill is a large frame building, 72 x 40; two stories. This mill was established in 1862 by Black and Forrester, and is decidedly the most successful mill in this section of the country. The present proprietor employs thirty hands, and has a 16 horse-power engine to propel the machinery used. He dresses from 80 to 100 tons of flax, and disposes of 4,000 bushels of flax seed annually. Mr. George Black is manager of the establishment.

SMITH & COLEMAN'S brewery is a frame, 60 x 40 feet, two stories, where four hands are employed in the manufacture of beer, ale and porter.

CRAIG & HAMILTON, builders, &c., were established 1864; they employ ten or twelve hands and a 13 horse-power engine, and have planing and matching machines. Wood turning and building is also carried on by them.

WESLEYAN METHODIST.—This is a fine stone building on Elgin Street, erected in 1856, at a cost of \$5,000. Rev. Joseph Holmes, Minister; assisted by Rev. J. W. McCallum.

METHODIST NEW CONNEXION.—A neat and handsome stone—gothic style of architecture—having capacity to seat 200. This Congregation for several years worshipped in the old school house, and in 1862 the present building was erected at a cost of \$1,300. There is a good parsonage connected with this church—and eight different congregations on the circuit. Rev. David Smith, Minister; assisted by Rev. W. Smith.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL.—A frame, purchased in 1862 and subsequently repaired. A neat stone parsonage in connection. Rev. Mr. Fansher, Minister.

BAPTIST.—Stone; erected in 1866; seated for 300, and cost \$1,500. The congregation was first organized in 1863, and worshipped in the Town Hall until the present church edifice was erected. Rev. E. B. Sharman, Minister.

MASONIC.—St. James Lodge, No. 73, A. F. and A. M., holds its regular meetings on the first Monday of each month in the Masonic Hall. George Marlatt, W.M.; Chas. Vangunten, Secretary.

TOWN OF STRATFORD

Is the County Town of Perth, and is situated on the River Avon at the angles of the Townships of Ellice, North and South Easthope and Downie,

and at the intersection of the Grand Trunk Railway with the Buffalo and Goderich section of the same Railway. When the Canada Company bargained with the Provincial Government of Upper Canada, through the Imperial Government, in 1827, for the purchase of a block of land to settle emigrants upon, there was what was then called the "Garden of Canada" for them to choose from. This was the Western Peninsula, west of the Grand River, which flows into Lake Erie. They chose the triangular block commencing with the east limits of the Townships of North and South Easthope, and extended the same towards Lake Huron, where the westerly limits of the triangle extended from and inclusive of the Township of Bosanquet, to and including the Township of Colborne. There the chief Rivers are the Aux Sable, Bayfield and Maitland. The north branch of the River Thames, which rises north of the Village of Mitchell, County of Perth, with the easterly branch in this county, the River Avon, (which flows through Stratford and into the Thames above St. Mary's) with the Black Creek, Whore Creek, and Front Creek, are the chief running waters in the easterly part of said triangular block. That block was then, in those days, called the "Huron Tract," a name chiefly known now to the first settlers.

The lands then acquired by the Canada Company as the "Huron Tract," were then in the possession of the Indians, and even in 1833, and following years, were frequented by them still, as their hunting grounds. There were, then, in July 1833, no settlers, (except the late J. J. E. Linton, Esq.,) settled in the bush where the County of Perth now is. To the south, the nearest neighbor he had, was near the governor's road, which leads to London, and to the north a few on what was called the "Huron Road," which leads to Goderich. North of that road, to the Georgian Bay, there were no settlers. The Company's lands in 1832 and 1833, were sold at one dollar and a-half per acre.

In 1829, and for years afterwards, the place where the flourishing village of Mitchell is, was known as the "Big Thames," and where Stratford now is, as the "Little Thames." These names up to 1840, were what they were known by. The Canada Company laid out and reserved a town plot or block of land for a village, both at Mitchell and Stratford. The extent of the latter reserve was about two thousand five hundred acres. The first Saw Mill was erected for the Canada Company, by Mr. D. Ford and Mr. John Sebring, at the then "Little Thames," in the first months of 1833. The Grist and Furring Mill for said Company, was erected under the management of same parties in 1834. The latter was the first erected on the Company's lands, and was the only one north and west of the line of London in these western parts at that time. The first settlers in these parts of the "Huron Tract," were Messrs. Sebastian Fryfogle, Andrew Sebach, and Henry Rumstaller. That was in 1829 and afterwards. The first emigrant settlers, as such, arrived in the fall of 1832. In the "Little Thames," there were two or three small log buildings covered with bark, erected by the contractors of the Canada Company. It

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may be said that the late William Sergeant, Esq., was the first emigrant settler as a resident of Stratford. He was the proprietor of the "Shakespeare Inn," and held lands in the Township adjoining.

The first Store was opened in one of the log shanties erected west of the bridge early in 1834, by Mr. George Worsley, and afterwards continued in a small frame building opposite, by John C. W. Daly, Esq., for several years. Mr. Daly acted as Postmaster, and had the appointment for many years. The nearest post office in 1833, to Stratford, was at Preston, County of Waterloo. The late Alexander F. Mickle, Esq., was afterwards Postmaster to the 10th March, 1858, when the Post Office was burned and he lost his life in the fire. Mr. Daly acted in Stratford as agent for the Canada Company in the sale of lands, from September 1833. He was succeeded as agent in after years in Stratford, by the late Alexander Macdonald, Esq., late of Toronto. The late Mr. John Monteith, (brother of the present Member for the North Riding of Perth, in the Ontario Legislature, Andrew Monteith, Esq.,) also commenced a store at an early date, which was successfully carried on for years by his brothers. The next store in 1839, was opened by Mr. John Gowinlock, afterwards continued by the late Mr. George Watson. This was at the corner where now is the large brick store of Mr. O'Higgins. As the settlement of the lands and the population increased, so did the trading business of Stratford.

In the settlement of the lands west and east of where Stratford is, there combined the settlers from England, Scotland, Ireland and Germany. The whole inhabitants now of the county are composed of natives and descendants of these countries. What is now the counties of Huron, Perth and Bruce, was then, in 1832, called the London District, and London was the District town. In a few years later, in 1838, the District and County of Huron was formed—Goderich on Lake Huron was the district town—the population of that district then was only 4001.

In 1847 efforts were made by the inhabitants of Stratford and neighborhood to have certain townships separated from the County of Huron and formed into a separate district and county—to be called Bannockburn or Peel—as the name was not agreed upon, though printed in the documents at the time. The population of this portion was then nigh 10,000. The late J. J. E. Linton, Esq., was delegated to Montreal, where Parliament then was, to obtain the separation; but other influences prevailed and the division was not then acceded to. In January, 1849, Mr. Linton was again sent to Montreal, and notwithstanding the many obstacles and dissensions amongst the political parties, he succeeded in obtaining a separation, and had the honor of naming the County with Stratford as the County town, when he called it "Perth," out of respect to the first and successful emigrants to North Easthope, who were from Glengwaich, Perthshire, in Scotland.

In 1852 the County Buildings in Stratford were completed. They consist of the Court House and Gaol,—with offices contained—built of brick, and handsomely placed on a plot of ground granted by W. F. McCulloch,

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Esq., above the North bank of the River Avon. In January, 1853, the county was set apart by proclamation of the Governor, and the public business has been since carried on as in all the other counties of the Province. The only change has been by way of a separate building as a Registry Office, which has been erected distinct from the others. It is fireproof.

In 1856, it was stated as to Stratford, that "as a place of internal importance it is destined to become second to no other Town in the Western Peninsula of Canada." It is a point of Junction of the Grand Trunk Railway, and the Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway. To all points of the Province, east or west, by these Railways, there is a communication from Stratford, and by the south of London, and to Sarnia, or to Buffalo direct, or via Hamilton and the Suspension Bridge, there is *also* communication to all travelled parts of the neighbouring United States. As a place of *import*, for wheat produce, from the neighboring townships, the *exports*, by the Railways, show that it is the *first* inland market for exportation of that valuable article of food.

The opportunities for secular and religious instruction are equal, and beyond most similar places. There is an excellent common school building, large size, of two stories, and its instruction is free. There are private schools also in the town: there is a good library, the room for it being in the said school building, under charge of the Mechanics' Institute. There are regularly in the town about eight denominations of professing christians, viz:

St. JAMES'—Church of England. This is a splendid new brick building, 130 feet long by 52 in width, 25 feet high, of the pure Gothic style of architecture; the spire will rise 133 feet high, and will be finished with ornamental vane, &c. The windows are of richly stained glass. The auditorium is 100 by 50 feet; seated for 800 on the ground floor, and 200 on the galleries. The inside is furnished with grained and stocco work; the galleries are lighted with a tier of windows in each side of the roof. This building surpasses in style of finish any in the County of Perth. Rev. E. Patterson, Incumbent.

St. JOSEPH'S, Roman Catholic, is a handsome building of white brick, with cut-stone dressings; erected in 1868 at a cost of \$30,000. Its dimensions are 160 feet long by 70 wide, the transepts being 82 feet and height 52. The style of architecture is the second period of Gothic. The windows are all filled with stained enamelled glass, presenting some very elegant scriptural devices. The spire, when completed, will be 180 feet high, in which will be hung a bell 2,000 lbs. weight. The inside consists of nave and side aisles, chancel, porches and vestry. The roof is supported by fourteen pillars, The ceiling is groined with moulded ribs and bosses. On each side of rear of transepts stands an octagonal pillar 50 feet high, which adds much to the beauty and stability of the structure. There are three entrance doors to the Auditorium, which is seated for 1,000 persons on the ground floor and 250 in the gallery. This superior church edifice reflects great credit on

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the architect, Mr. John Turner, of Brantford. The Very Revd. Dean Crinnan is the Pastor.

ST. ANDREW'S, Presbyterian Church of Canada, in connection with the Church of Scotland, is a handsome white brick building, Gothic style of architecture; erected in 1868 at a cost of \$7,000, having capacity to seat 400, being 75 by 44 feet in dimensions. The basement is used for lecture room, sabbath school, &c. The windows are all of richly stained enamelled glass. This is the oldest Presbyterian congregation in this part of the country. The Revd. James George, D.D., is the Minister in charge since 1862.

CANADA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, on Norman street, is a plain brick building, 56 by 36 feet; erected in 1851, and cost \$2,000. This building is expected ere long to give place to one of greater capacity, as it is inadequate to meet the present want of the congregation. Revd. Thomas McPherson is Pastor since its formation in 1849.

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH is a plain brick building, 56 by 30, situated on Erie street; erected in 1866 at a cost of \$3,000. There is a neat parsonage in connection with this Church. Rev. Charles Lavell, M.A., Minister.

PRIMITIVE METHODIST CHURCH is a neat frame building erected in 1864; cost \$500.

BAPTIST CHURCH is a handsome frame building, 65 by 45 feet; erected in 1861 and cost \$1,500; seated for 300. This Church was organized in 1859, through the labors of Rev. R. McLellan, and continued to make steady progress since that period. The Rev. J. McLaurin is the present Minister in charge.

GERMAN LUTHERAN CHURCH is a frame, 34 by 28 feet; built in 1863. It is situated on Brunswick street.

SALEM CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH is a plain frame building, 38 by 24 feet; erected in 1847, and cost \$2,400. Rev. E. C. W. McColl, M. A.

The Town Hall, Drill Shed, and other public and private buildings will compare favourably with those of larger places.

The Stratford woollen mill of Messrs. J. Sugden & Sons, on Ontario street, is frame, 78 by 32 feet; 2½ stories high; 15 to 20 hands are employed, and an 18 horse-power engine in the manufacturing of tweeds, full-cloths, flannels and blankets, &c., custom carding, spinning, weaving, dressing, dyeing and fulling, &c.

Lawson & Kerr's woollen mills and tannery.

Wm. Easson's steam saw-mill on William street.

The large foundry and agricultural implement manufactory of Joseph Sharman is on Birmingham street. These buildings cover an area of about one acre, in which 20 hands are employed, and an engine of 12 horse-power used to propel the machinery. The Ohio, Buckeye self-raker, reapers and mowers combined, the little giant threshing machine for a farmer's own use, horse-power wood-sawing machines, straw and root cutters and all kinds of agricultural implements are here manufabured.

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A. Smith's tannery, 62 by 42, is a brick, building, sole, upper and harness leather, kips and calf-skins, skirting, pebble, grain and buff are manufactured in good style.

G. A. Hilton is also engaged in the same line of business.

Messrs. Miller Bros. are extensively engaged in the manufacture of carriages, wagons, sleighs, cutters, agricultural implements, pressed steel mould boards, Miller's patent hay-fork, and carry on general blacksmithing. Their buildings are 56 by 40, two stories, and 56 by 28, one story; six men are employed.

R. Lean is engaged in the same line of business; he employs about eight hands. His buildings are frame, 50 by 25 and 40 by 20 feet

Charles Duperoho carries on the business of carriage and wagon-making and general blacksmithing in all its branches; his buildings are frame, 45 by 25 feet, and are situated on Market street.

The large flax mills carried on by Messrs. Marshall & Fuller were established in 1866. They dress 100 tons of scutched flax annually in a frame building, 100 by 45 feet, where an engine of 25 horse-power is used, and 35 to 40 hands employed; in the season of pulling and rotting 200 persons are at work.

The large steam and water, flour and grist mills of Mr. Adam L. Argo, on Water street, 60 by 60 feet, three stories high, with four run of stone, have the capacity to dress and pack 140 bls. of flour daily, and 100 bushels of custom work.

Mr. John Boag's steam flouring mill, on Market street, is a frame, 60 by 50 feet, three stories, with three run of stone, and an engine of 40 horse-power; dresses and packs 100 bls. of flour daily. This mill was established in 1858.

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THE ROMAN CATHOLIC SEPARATE SCHOOL is a frame building, 100 by 36; over 200 children attend, and it is under the superintendence of Mr. Cornelius Sullivan, first-class teacher and principal of the school.
