COUNTY OF OXFORD.

This County is situated in the western Peninsula of Ontario, and is bounded on the north by the Counties of Perth and Waterloo; on the east by the Counties of Waterloo and Brant; on the south by the County of Norfolk; and on the west by the Counties of Middlesex and Elgin. It covers an area of over 700 square miles of as fertile and luxurious a tract of country as can probably anywhere be found in Ontario of the same size. Population last census, 48,247.

It began to be settled during the latter part of the last century; and, lying on the route between the eastern and western sections of the Province, it early became cleared and peopled by inhabitants who, by their sterling industry and perseverance, have reaped their reward in amassing in many instances a handsome competence for themselves and families.

The soil is principally composed of a clay loam, except the southern portion, which is more sandy and considerably hilly; but on the whole the County is well adapted for agricultural and especially dairy purposes,—the latter branch of farming husbandry being introduced into this County earlier than anywhere else in the Province, *i. e.*, upon the factory system, which has reached such an importance now that it exports over 100,000 boxes of cheese annually to foreign markets, the revenue from which it may readily be conceived amounts to a very considerable sum. This branch of agriculture has done and is doing much for the benefit of the County as well as for its inhabitants, inasmuch as while they are receiving far higher returns as the products of their farms, the soil is every year becoming more rich under pasturage, being invigorated by its rest from cultivation. There are now about 150 cheese factories in active operation in the County, and all seem to be doing a good satisfactory business, which may be witnessed from the fact that every year there are new ones being erected and the exports are annually increasing.

The whole County has been well wooded, principally with beach and maple, except towards the south where there were great quantities of pine, until it has been gradually taken off and worked into lumber, of which there has been a large amount manufactured and shipped to different quarters.

The principal water privileges consist of the River Thames and its branches, the Otter Creek and the River Nith, which only runs through a part of the township of Blenheim. There are some very good mills on these streams, but the power they afford is not first-class, for in the summer season, especially when the weather is dry, the water becomes so low as to be of very little use.

The general manufacturing and commercial interests are well represented in its towns and villages; for although the County is inland, having no facilities for navigation whatever, it is well supplied with Railway accommodation, there being now the Great Western, the Buffalo and Lake Huron branch of the Grand Trunk, the Canada Southern and the Air-Line Railroads running through it, with a prospect of an early increase in the shape of the Credit Valley and the Woodstock and Port Dover Railroads, so that there are now competing lines both East and West and North and South, by means of which the wants of the County are carefully provided for.

Woodstock, the County Town, is situated on the Great Western Railway, about 50 miles west of Hamilton and 30 east of London, and is a very thriving town of about 4,700 inhabitants, in which there is now one large foundry in operation, and one under course of erection by Mr. Whitelaw, of the Oxford Foundry, Beachville, who is building a very large brick foundry in close proximity to the Great Western Railway Station, where he will employ in the neighborhood of 100 men. There are also several large grist mills, carriage factories, planing-mills, cabinet factories and a melodeon and organ factory. It is also a Port of Entry.

Ingersoll is situated 10 miles west of Woodstock, and numbers rather more inhabitants, and its manufactories are more extensive, there evidently being, if not so much real wealth,

at least more enterprise and ambition, which may be evidenced by the manner in which the Town has been and is being rebuilt after the fires with which it has been so lately visited; and we question whether any town of the same size in Ontario would, under similar circumstances, have recovered more quickly or successfully such great calamities. There has always been a sort of petty contention existing between Ingersoll and Woodstock. They both appear to be ever vying with each other for the precedence, which fact we may say is not as yet very definitely settled.

Tilsonburg was incorporated as a Town about two years ago, and although its location is very unfavorable (being built between two large hills) and its soil very sandy, it is surrounded by a very good arable tract of country; and owing to the fact that it has lately become a Station on the Air Line and Canada Southern Railways, it is now rapidly growing and increasing in importance, so that it now numbers nearly 2,000 inhabitants. There has been a very large lumbering trade done at this place, but of course it has ceased to be of such importance now that the pine has been pretty much used up; but the large saw-mills on the Otter Creek at one time did an immense business. It has a large planing-mill, two or three saw-mills, two grist-mills, sash and door factory, and two or three very fine carriage factories, as well as other manufacturing establishments, with new ones in course of erection.

There are several villages,—Embrow, Norwich, Otterville, Beachville, Princeton, Drumbo, Plattsville, Bright, and others of minor importance. There are saw-mills, grist-mills, &c., at all of the above named places; and at Plattsville and Beachville, a considerable trade is done in flax, there being large flax-mills at both these villages. This business in these places bids fair to yet become of considerable importance, as the people in the vicinity seem to be entering into it more extensively every year.

The Townships of East Zorra, Blandford and Blenheim, are especially well adapted for agricultural purposes, and it is questionable whether there is a more wealthy and thickly settled section of country anywhere in the western peninsula. The soil is of an exceedingly rich clay loam, and is well watered, being dotted over with numerous small spring water lakes.

In fact, the whole of the other Townships—West Zorra, East Nissouri, North, West and East Oxford, Dereham, and North and South Norwich, except it be South Norwich, and the southern portion of Dereham, which are (as before stated) somewhat sandy—are composed of excellent farming lands, and all are now under a first-class state of cultivation.

Of course there are numerous small villages we have omitted in this general description of the County, but which will be noticed in their turn.

The northern part of the County was principally settled by Scotch and Germans, who have become generally speaking very wealthy, especially the Germans in the Townships of Blandford and Blenheim, and they have brought these two townships into a state of cultivation equalled by few in the Province. The southern part is filled up by people of a more general nationality, who, although they have cultivated the country in a very workmanlike manner, have neither erected as good buildings, nor acquired as much wealth as their northern neighbors. This, however, may in part be owing to the fact that it was somewhat later in being opened up.

The religion is pretty generally diversified, there being a great many churches (and some very elegant ones) of almost every denomination. The majority however, are Church of England, Presbyterian and Methodist, although there are several Baptist and a few Roman Catholic and Quaker churches.

There are many other items we might notice with regard to this County which might be of interest to the public but we must forbear for lack of space, having endeavored as briefly as possible to give a general idea of the position, properties and characteristics of this County, which, although not as old as many others in the Province, can creditably compare with the most of them, either as to its material worth or agricultural prosperity, in proportion to its size and extent.

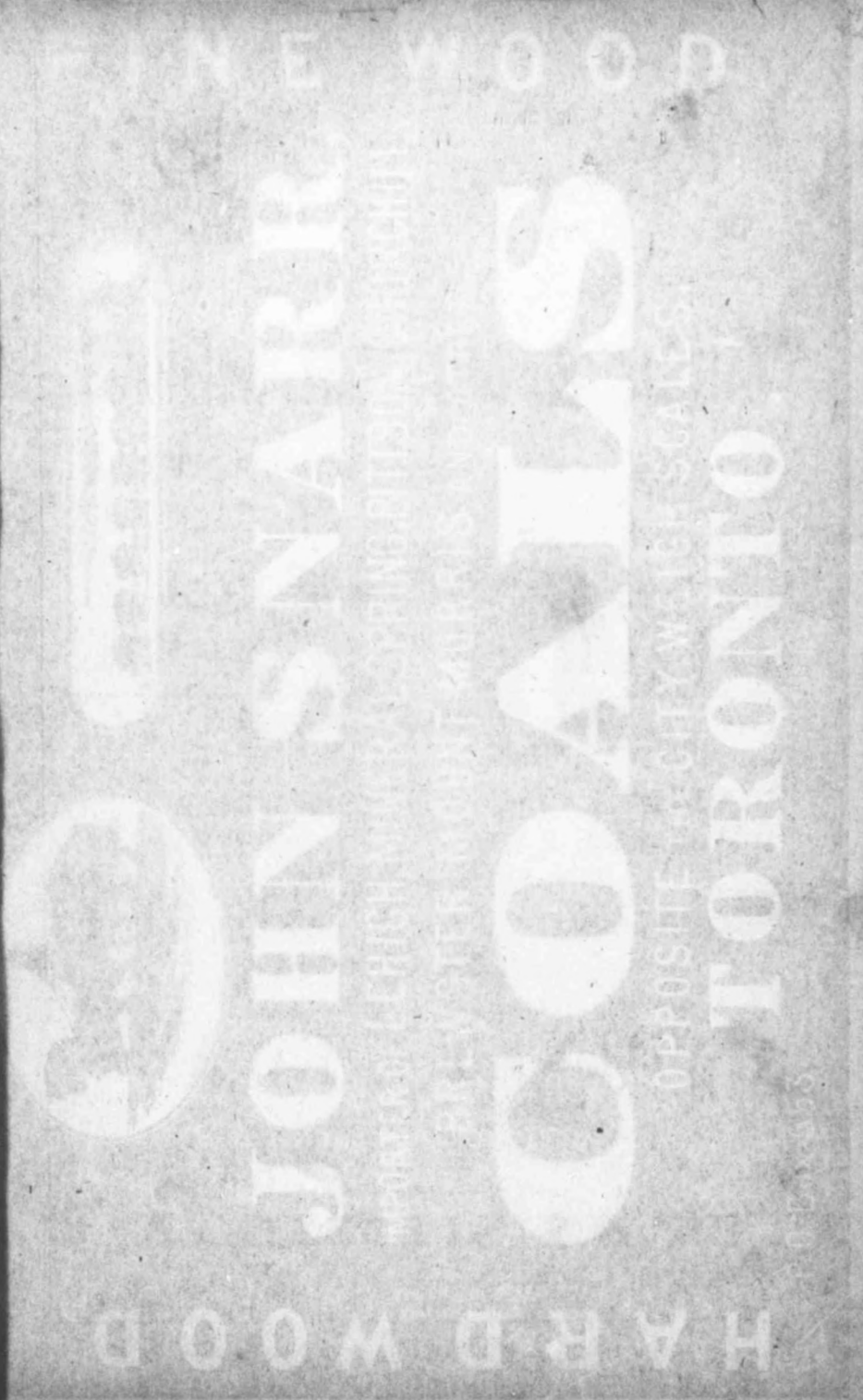


