DRUMBO.—This thriving Village is situated in the centre of the Township of Blenheim, the country surrounding being very rich and fertile, and the farms all well improved. On the 5th of June, 1862, the business portion of the village was burned to the ground, over forty buildings being destroyed in two hours. The village was rebuilt, and in February, 1864, again burned. The land on which the village is built is principally owned by Henry Muma, Esq. He is now about erecting buildings on some of the lots. The Grand Trunk Railway passes through the village, giving it excellent advantages. The Credit Valley Railway, running from Toronto to St. Thomas, crosses the Grank Trunk here, and will form a junction, and with these advantages Drumbo, now a thriving village, must become a populous town. H. Muma, Esq., will throw into the market in the spring a large number of village lots at the junction of the two railroads. The village contains several fine stores, a foundry, tannery, carriage shop, blacksmith's shop, three hotels, four churches, Presbyterian, Wesleyan Methodist, Primitive Methodist, and Church

INGERSOLL.—Situated on the River Thames, in the County of Oxford, and is built partly in the Township of West, and partly in the Township of North Oxford. The manufacturing interests, as at present developed, are probably the largest of any town of its size in Western Canada. There are two very large foundries. The largest, being lately erected by the Noxon Bros. Manufacturing Co., is connected with the G. W.R. by a switch, and is in close proximity to the station. This building is upwards of 500 feet in length and 200 in breadth. The company employ considerably over one hundred men, and this year will turn out over 1,000 machines, being principally reapers, mowers, and sawing machines. The other is owned by Messrs. Eastwood & Co., which, although not as large as Messrs. Noxon's, does a large amount of work, and employs over one hundred men. There are also four large steam grist-mills, and two very large sash and door factories, the one owned by A. Oliver & Co., and the other by John Christopher & Bros. There is more cheese exported from this place than any other town in Canada. The surrounding country being excellent for dairy purposes, and the people being early educated in this branch of farming husbandry, this trade has grown so rapidly that the amount of cheese now manufactured in the county of Oxford (all of which, with a great deal beside, is

shipped at this station) far exceeds that of any other county in Ontario. There are some very handsome churches, two banks (Merchants and the Niagara District), and some of the finest private residences in the County, more of which are being now erected, which shows the cultivated tastes of the inhabitants. In May, 1872, the town suffered very severely from fire, almost the whole or the greater portion at least of the business part of the place being destroyed. This for a time proved a very serious drawback to its prosperity, but still it only served to exhibit and call forth the latent energy of its citizens, for to-day there is scarcely a trace of the fire to be seen, and the Town presents a far more handsome and business-like appearance than ever before; and the shops on Thames Street can bear comparison with any west of Toronto. The streets are lighted with gas. The more recent fire of July last destroyed some very fine buildings, but even now the owners are busy rebuilding. We believe this is one of the chief stations on the G.W.R., four passenger trains each way stopping here every day. The Montreal and Dominion Telegraph Companies each have an office here. Distant from London, 19 miles; Hamilton, 60 miles; Port Burwell, 38 miles; Suspension Bridge, 100 miles; Toronto, 100 miles, and Detroit, 129 miles. Two mails each way, daily. Population, between 4,500 and 5,000.

facturing Company, established 1856, is very extensive, the building being 500 x 200 feet. The company employs over one hundred men in the manufacture principally of reapers, mowers and sawing machines.

Ingersoll Foundry.—This foundry was established in the year 1837, and is the oldest in the county. These works were started with small pretensions, but have from year to year been so extended that they now compare favorably with any similar works in the Province. Agricultural implements of all descriptions, engines, boilers, and tools are here manufactured, and the jobbing department is extensively patronized. Sales are not confined to the Province of Ontario, but articles manufactured by this firm are to be found in all parts of the Dominion. This establishment gives employment to over one hundred mechanics, and every facility in the shape of tools for the saving of labor is provided.

A. Oliver & Co., Riccarton Mills, established 1855, contractors and lumber dealers, manufacturers of doors, sash blinds and cheese boxes, with saw-mill attached, capacity, 10,000 feet per day. Shop 40 x 90, three storeys high; boiler and cheese box rooms, 20 x 90, two storeys high; saw-mill, 24 x 80, two storeys high; storehouse, 40 x 40, two storeys high; one engine, 20 horse-power; one engine, 35 horse-power; one boiler, 70 horse power; and gives work to sixty-five men on an average, summer and winter.

J. Christopher & Brothers, contractors, manufacturers of all kinds of building materials, doors, sash mouldings, cheese boxes, &c. This factory was established in 1850, and gives employment to one hundred men.

The Woollen Mills of Messrs. Waterhouse & Bradbury are very extensive. The mills were established in 1865, and are situated on Queen Street, size of building 90 x 40 feet, four storeys high; employ fourteen hands, and manufacture about 48,000 yards of cloth per annum besides custom work.

Mr. Hector Campbell carries on a very extensive business in the pump line, turning out about 500 pumps in the year.

Carriages.—This branch of business is fully represented, among which we notice the works of Mr. George Bailey, situated on

King Street, corner Hall Street, established in 1854. Employment is given to thirty men, and everything in the carriage line is turned out in first-class style and workmanship.

McIntyre & Crotty, cabinet and chair manufacturers, established 1854, steam power, employ about thirty men. This firm do a very extensive business, and import immense assortments of cabinet-ware and chairs.

Marble Works.—Mr. W. M. Dwyer does a very extensive business in this line, employing a number of hands, and turns out first-class work.

House & Bevins, in the same line, do a very extensive business.

Thames Oil Works, established 1868; capacity, 1,000 barrels per week; employ twenty men.

Holy system of water works, at a cost of seventeen thousand dollars, to be driven by water-power. It is expected to have them in operation the coming winter. Petroleum has been discovered here, although not in paying quantities. When the oil business ceased, a well was driven for salt. It is now 1,700 feet deep. It is expected salt rock will be reached at a depth of 1,900 feet. The town contains a number of very fine stores, dry goods and grocery, shoe shops, harness shops, foundries and machine shops. Tailoring establishments, carriage factories, cabinet factories, grist-mills, saw-mills, sash and door factories, planing mills, a number of hotels, the principal being the Queen's, kept by D. Merrill; photographic gallery; a very fine school, in which there are four teachers; and a weekly newspaper, *The Observer*, published by W. S. Law, who has in connection a book and stationery store. Population, about 1800.

MANUFACTURERS.

In this line we shall start with Mr. E. D. Tilson. First in order is the saw-mill, 80 x 85 feet; contains two large circular and one muley saw, edger and lath saw and shingle-mill; all driven by water, eighty horse power, and capable of cutting 8,000,000 feet lumber, and 3,000,000 shingles per annum, running ten hours per day. This mill gives employment to twenty men. Next is the planing mill, and sash and door factory. The building is 70 x 80 feet, two storeys high, contains two large planers, and all necessary machinery for manufacturing door, sash, blinds, &c.; driven by water; forty horse power; and gives employment to from ten to fifteen hands. Then comes the grist and flouring mill, 35 x 70 feet; four storeys high, three run of stones; three bolt and other machinery required for flouring and gristing of all description; driven by water; fifty horse power; capacity, 100 barrels per day; at present only three hands are employed in this mill. We believe it is Mr. Tilson's intention to increase this branch of his business. Next is the oatmeal-mill, 40 x 72 feet, four storeys high, for splitting peas and manufacturing oatmeal and cornmeal, all for shipping; the mill is driven by water power, and has three run of stones, capable of making 200 barrels per day. The above mill is not yet complete; expected to be running in November. Mr. Tilson has also a blacksmith's shop, which gives employment to two hands; a brickyard, employing six hands; and is largely engaged in building, employing eight carpenters, eight masons, three painters. Has a large farm of between two and three hundred acres; and is engaged in the mercantile business, hardware and groceries. The hardware branch alone amounting to about \$25,000 per annum. Mr. Tilson is also engaged in boring for salt. The well is now 1,700 feet deep; it is expected salt rock will

Sash and Door Factory and Saw-Mill.—Carried on by George Smith & Bro., and situated on Rolph Street. This firm are also very largely engaged in the manufacture of cheese boxes, and do a very large contracting business. They employ about twenty hands.

WOODSTOCK.—The County Town and Judicial seat of the County of Oxford. Is pleasantly situated in a central location, in the south-west corner of the Township of Blandford, bordering on the River Thames and Cedar Creek, and is a Station on the Great Western Railway; distant from Hamilton, 48 miles; and from London, 29 miles. Population, 4,700. The town will be very much improved by the construction of the Credit Valley, and Port Dover and Lake Huron Railways; the latter having its head offices here. Woodstock has been always considered slow in its growth, but at the same time the progress has been substantial and sure. In the year 1854 the total assessment of the town amounted to \$41,293; this year it will exceed \$1,000,000: thus in twenty years it has doubled in value nearly five times. All this has been accomplished simply from force of business by the demands of the wealthy section in which it is located, rather than in the inherent energy or enterprise of the business men within. The receipts at the G. W. Station for the year 1873, for passenger, freight and general traffic, amounted to the sum of \$80,000, yet no place has suffered more of late for want of railway competition than Woodstock. Its grain and produce market was noted, for many years after the opening of the G. W. Railway, for its greatness, but on account of the large "through business" of that road, absorbing its almost entire capacity, accommodation has been withheld, consequently shippers could not give as high prices for grain as those places having competing lines, hence the market here has lost its once favored position. This may account, partly at least, for the liberality of the town in promoting, by such large bonuses, the construction of

more railways. The present population of the town is 4,700, and would now be very much larger if houses could have been obtained. Strangers living on their means admire it for its pleasant, clean and healthy appearance, and very many take up their abode here during the summer season. A large number also are attracted here on account of the superior educational privileges afforded by its schools, and more particularly the Canadian Literary Institute. No town of its size surpasses Woodstock in the magnificence and value of some of its retail stores, and none stand higher with wholesale men than do the merchants and business men of this place. In manufactures the town is well represented, in almost every department; descriptions of which will be found under the heading of manufactures.

Mr. Whitelaw is prepared to turn out mill machinery, steam engines, steam boilers, cheese factory engines and fixtures, shaftings, pulleys, &c., on the shortest notice, and best workmanship.

Scotfield's Mills, established 1853.—The main building which is leased by R. Bickerton & Co., contractors and builders, is 170 x 40 feet, two storeys high. The other part of building consists of a saw-mill, 60 x 40 feet, carried on by F. B. Scotfield, who manufactures cheese boxes, broom-handles, wood turning, &c. The premises occupied by Messrs.
