TOWNSHIP OF PLYMPTON.

This Township is bounded on the north by Lake Huron, on the west by Sarnia, on the south by Warwick, and on the north-east by Bosanquet. The soil and timber of this Township are of a very fine quality, the land being generally rich, and the timber the best kind of hardwood. In 1846 there were only 2,516 acres under cultivation, and 19,484 taken up. The value of rateable property was about \$33,000, and the population 639. The population in 1861 was 3,287.

TOWN OF SARNIA.

Sarnia, the county town and judicial seat of the County of Lambton, is pleasantly situated on the St. Clair river, immediately opposite and distant one mile from the City of Port Huron, in the State of Michigan, which has a population of in or about five thousand inhabitants.

Sarnia was laid out by private individuals in the year one thousand eight hundred thirty-three, and within the last eight or ten years has rapidly increased in population and business importance.

The two great railroads, the Great Western and Grand Trunk, have their termini here, the former immediately in the town at its southern end; the latter at Point Edward, a place not exactly within the corporation, but on a neck of land or promontory immediately north of it, both of which have done much to enhance its position, and each have elevators of the largest capacity. The Grand Trunk has a stage running six times daily from the principal hotels to Point Edward, to meet the trains both on arrival and departure; fare each way 12½c. They also have a large ferry-boat called the St. Clair, and an immense vessel called the Huron, for the conveyance of freight cars from one side of St. Clair River to the other. The Huron takes 18 cars heavily loaded across each trip. She was originally built for a swing ferry-boat, but failed; she is now towed by the St. Clair.

In connection with the Great Western, a very nice though small ferry-boat, the Sarnia, runs from Sarnia to Port Huron, making trips every half hour; James Moffat owner and master, fare 10 cents, going and returning.

Sarnia, previous to the introduction of steam tugs, was the last place of departure for hundreds of vessels, some of which often were weather-bound there for ten or twelve days, and helped the town considerably, taking their lake stores from thence. The harbor, which is considered one of the best on the lakes, is situated about two miles south of Lake Huron, and its bay, which is of great size, sheltered by Point Edward, capable of giving safe anchorage to five or six hundred vessels, is deep and free from current; but the river St. Clair, from the lighthouse at Fort Gratiot, in Michigan, having a current of over four miles per hour, is not navigable to vessels (not propelled by steam) save with a very strong south or south-easterly or westerly wind. In consequence of the introduction of steam tugs, but very few vessels are now wind-bound in the harbor.

The soil north and east of Sarnia, for about five miles, is quite sandy and

unproductive, and on the south-east, where it is of a rich clayey loam, four square miles are reserved for the Indians, in consequence of which the river road to Moore, and other southern townships, is allowed to get into bad repair, the township of Sarnia considering that Government should do the four miles. Notwithstanding these drawbacks, however, the town is well supplied with all descriptions of produce, large quantities finding their way across the river.

Sarnia is a Port of Entry, has a Collector of Customs and Landing Waiter resident in the town. It has two Out-posts, namely, Point Edward and Moortown, with officers at each. Previous to the war there was much smuggling done, but the tables are turned, and the business goes the other way now.

Sarnia is about sixty miles west of London, and same north-west of Chatham, Windsor and Detroit; has to the former place a plank and macadamized road, and a branch of the Great Western Railroad; to Chatham a common graded road, and to Detroit and Windsor water and railroad communication by Grand Trunk. At the time we write, there is in construction a plank road of the best description to the Oil Springs, in Enniskillen, which will open up a splendid woodland country, and will tend to keep the wood market at a low rate; the distance is only eighteen miles. The corporation took \$20,000, or about half the stock in it. It is believed the road will pay without taxing the inhabitants. There are also other roads leading into Sarnia, which make it accessible as a market for the products of a rich agricultural country, to the east and south.

The value of the exports from Sarnia in 1844 was only \$14,237, principally potash, fish and lumber, all other articles amounting in value to about \$500. In 1850 the exports were valued at \$156,425, showing an increase in six years of \$142,188. The population in 1846 was about 400, while in 1850 it was upwards of 800, having doubled itself in the small space of four years. Its population now is about 2,500, giving an increase in the last ten years of 1,700. Its general appearance has also been greatly improved in the same period, by the erection of a superior class of private dwellings, stores and public buildings. The Bank of Upper Canada, School Houses, Town Hall, Court House and Gaol, the three former being built of brick and the latter of stone, are all situated in the North Ward, and all (with the exception of the schools, which are on George street) on Christina street. The streets, generally, are regularly laid out at right angles, the only exception being between Front and Christina streets, where, in consequence of the former being on the river line, it causes an angle in many of the lots. The sidewalks are good, and in Front street eleven feet wide, the other streets generally four feet. The town is built on a flat table-land, about eighteen feet above the river.

Manufactures of various kinds are carried on with great success. There is a large foundry capable of turning out castings 4,000 pounds weight, a steam brewery, two saw mills, a grist mill, two tanneries, and three oil refineries, all in active operation. We may here remark, that on completion of the new plank road the petroleum trade of Sarnia will form an important item. It also contains three waggon and carriage shops, four blacksmith shops, two hardware stores, two bakeries, two watch-makers, two cabinet shops and warehouses, several boot and shoe stores, and numerous dry goods and grocery stores, seven hotels and three saloons, four billiard tables, and four butchers, who have stalls in the market on Lochiel Street, besides private shops for corned, dried meats and sausages. The town also contains the following churches,—Episcopal, Roman Catholic, United Presbyterian, Wesleyan Methodist, Congregational and Baptist. It has also a temple of the National Division of Good Templars, a Temperance Society, a Freemasons' Lodge and Chapter, and an Orange Lodge, the officers of all of which for the current year will be found in another part of this work. Two newspapers are published weekly,—the *Observer*, J. R. Gemmill, Esq., Editor and Proprietor, is a Reform paper having a very large circulation, and the *British Canadian*, Conservative, owned and edited by J. H. Wood, Esq. The former has been published with great success for the past ten years, and will bear comparison with any other paper in the Province. The latter has been published about six years.

The town has three members in the Legislature,—Hon. Alexander Vidal, M.L.C., for the St. Clair Division, Alexander Mackenzie, M.P.P. for the County of Lambton, and Hope F. Mackenzie, M.P.P. for North Oxford.

Sarnia contains its share of mechanics, &c., and its business is in a flourishing and healthy condition; having the benefit of navigation in summer and railroads in winter it does not experience the fluctuations consequent upon the absence of one or both of these.

In a word, Sarnia may be denominated a flourishing town.

OIL SPRINGS.

This large and rapidly improving village is situated in the Township of Enniskillen on Bear Creek, a tributary of the Sydenham. It is distant from Wyoming, a station on the Sarnia branch of the Great Western Railway, 12 miles, (daily stages run between both places,—fare 50 cts.) from Sarnia 22 miles direct, and 28 by stage and rail, and from London 56 miles. Oil Springs owes its rise and progress to the discovery of petroleum or rock oil in the vicinity and place where the village now stands. Oil was observed here on the surface of the water a number of years previous to its nature and value being understood. The International Mining Company, formed for the purpose of ascertaining the mineral wealth of the Township of Enniskillen, was superceded in 1858 by Mr. Williams, who subsequently sold out to the Canada Rock Oil Company, of which he is at present president. When it was discovered that petroleum existed in what was then considered inexhaustible quantities, capitalists came to the field from the United States and different parts of Canada, encouraged by the extraordinary flow of oil from the first wells. From the want of adequate preparations great quantities of oil were entirely lost; the number of barrels of oil lost from one flowing well, owned by Messrs. Black & Matheson, being estimated at 30,000 barrels. The copious flow of oil from the first wells had the effect of enhancing the value of the oil territory to an almost fabulous degree, and gave an impetus to business of every description in the village, which was laid out in 1860 by J. M. Williams, James Thompson, W. E. Sanborn and Hugh M. Shaw, since which time it has attained a population of about 2,000 inhabitants. It contains eight general stores, five blacksmith shops, two shoe shops, twenty-five carpenters, one cabinet shop, two tailor shops, one carriage shop, five cooperages, five hotels, one physician, two churches, a good school, an agency of the Bank of Montreal, an office of the Oil Springs and Wyoming Telegraph Company. The Oil interests are represented and advocated by a weekly journal under the title of the Oil Springs' *Chronicle*, edited by Messrs W. W. Evans and T. J. Hudson. The number of oil wells now sunk are estimated at 300, some of which are pumped by steam, the rest by horse power. Wells, refineries and stills extend along Black Creek for three miles. The aggregate capacity of all the refineries is 1,800 barrels, of the stills 500 barrels. The 8th Division Court is held here, of which Mr. George Adamson is Clerk. Although the yield of petroleum has considerably decreased, a steady and advantageous business will undoubtedly be carried on in it for a number of years.

PORT FRANKS.

It has made little or no progress. The Post Office was removed in 1856. It contains one hotel, one steam saw mill and a few houses. It is the only point vessels can touch between Sarnia and Bayfield.

WYOMING.

The village of Wyoming is situated in the township of Plympton on the line of the Sarnia branch of the G.W.R.R., being twelve miles north of the village of Oil Springs, sixteen miles from Sarnia and forty five miles from London. There is a plank road leading from Wyoming to Oil Springs. The property for the village was bought when the Branch line was first surveyed, but the village did not make much progress until the discovery of petroleum at Oil Springs. The population of the village is about 550, most of whom are engaged in the oil trade. The principal business done in the place comprises oil [crude and refined], staves, timber, grain and country produce in general. Wyoming contains two churches [Episcopal and Methodist], a good Common School, an agency of the American Express Company, a branch of the Montreal Telegraph Company, which is continued to Oil Springs, two stores, four hotels, one drug store, three shoe shops, three blacksmith shops, five cooper shops, two butcher shops, two livery stables, one foundry and machine shop, one grist, carding and fulling mill, one cabinetmaker's shop, three carpenter's and joiner's shops, two tailor shops, two wagon shops, one billiard saloon, six oil refineries, two physicians. The Post Office was established in 1856, Geo. Brown, sen., postmaster.

JUDICIARY OF THE COUNTY OF LAMBTON.

COUNTY COURT.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county.—Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant, or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties, or signature of the defendant, to £100; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers, to the amount of £50, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. Officers of Court.—Judge, Charles Robinson; Clerk, J. R. Gemmill,

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—For the trial of issues of fact, and the assessment of damages, on the second Tuesday in March, June, September, and and December, in each year. Charles Robinson, Chairman.

SURROGATE COURT.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada, and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts. J. R. Gemmill, Registrar.

LAW CIRCUITS.—The Courts of the western Circuit are held in St. Thomas, Sandwich, Sarnia, Chatham, London and Goderich. Clerk of Assizes, Deputy Clerk of the Crown, ex officio.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £25; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £10; but not to actions for gambling debts, liquors drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, etc., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction, or breach of promise, or actions against a J.P., for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge.—The Divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions.—Charles Robinson, Judge.
