CLEARVILLE.

A post village in the Township of Orford, situated on Lot 59, Talbot St. road, distant about thirty miles from Chatham, and one mile and a quarter from Lake Erie. The first settlers were Philip Bury, Neil McFarlane and Benjamin Brown. The post office was established in 1832. The village contains two hotels, two general stores, one grist and one fulling mill, one blacksmith shop, and a good school. Daily Mails. Population about 100.

James Boyle and Capt. Taylor were among the first settlers. The third Division Court is held here. It contains two churches, Episcopal and Wesleyan Methodist, one flouring mill, one carding and fulling mill, one sawmill, two hotels, a carriage and waggon maker, blacksmith, &c. Daily mails. Population, about 200.

A post office in the township of Tilbury East, County of Kent, on lot 162, 20 miles from Chatham, the county town. The post office was established in 1859, Joseph Smith first postmaster; present postmaster, Isaac Russell; assistant postmaster, Isaac Lambert.

DOVER SOUTH.

A post village of the Township of Dover, County of Kent; settled about the year 1853. Distant from Chatham six miles. Population about 75.

GERVAIS, STANIS, P.M.

DRESDEN.

A post village situated on the river Sydenham, at the head of navigation. It was laid out in 1846 by Peter Windover and William Wright were among the first settlers. The post office was established in 1854, Mr. Blackwood first postmaster. The principal business consists in the shipping of square timber, staves and cordwood. Vessels of 300 tons can load here.

Dresden is a thriving village, and at present contains one Episcopal church, brick, Rev. Thomas Hughes; Congregational, Rev. Wm. Clark; Episcopal Methodist, Rev. Mr. Rouston; Wesleyan Methodist, Rev. Mr. Hooker; Methodist, (colored) Rev. Mr. Hawkins, and Baptist, Rev. S. H. Davis; two common schools, (one for colored children) one flouring and two saw mills, a tannery, several stores, two carriage and waggon factories, &c. A bridge is being erected across the river.

Distance from Chatham, 16 miles; from Thamesville, the nearest railway station, 13 miles. Daily mails. Population about 600.

THAMESVILLE OR TECUMSEH.*

A village and station on the Great Western railway, at the intersection of the London, Chatham, Morpeth and Florence roads, principally situated on lot fifteen, concession B, township of Camden. The site was surveyed in 1856 by David Sherman, Esq. Wm. Mayhew was the first postmaster. It is distant from Chatham 15 miles; London, 50 miles; Morpeth, 12 miles, and from Ridgetown, 9 miles. There are good grounds to believe that a rich vein of petroleum lies in and near the village, and salt and iron ore have been found. The sixth Division Court is held here. Daily mails. Population about 600.

About three miles from Thamesville is the Indian settlement of Moravian town, the site of the "Battle of the Thames," between the British and the Americans, Oct. 5, 1813. We condense the following account of this memorable engagement from the "History of the War of 1812-15."

"The principal result of 'Perry's Victory' was to necessitate the abandonment of all the positions held by the British beyond Lake Erie, and it was the intention of General Proctor to retire on the centre division at Niagara. Unfortunately the mingled reproaches and entreaties of Tecumseh induced him to change his intention and retire on the Moravian village, nearly half way between Amherstburg and the centre division, and there await the pursuing enemy. The following is the closing clause of the chief's speech:—'Father! you have got the arms and ammunition which our great father sent for his red children. If you have any idea of going away give them to us, and you may go in welcome for us. Our lives are in the hands of the Great Spirit. We are determined to defend our lands, and if it is His will we wish to leave our bones upon them.'

"The British were drawn up in line in a wood, not far from the Moravian settlement, with the Indians on the right, and a piece of cannon, a six-pounder on the left. The whole British force actually engaged in the battle numbered four hundred and seventy-six men. The Americans numbered twelve hundred cavalry, nineteen hundred and fifty infantry, and one hundred and fifty Indians.

"Harrison drew up his forces in two lines, and commenced the attack by a simultaneous charge on both the British and Indians. In both cases the first charge was repulsed, but a second decided the fate of the day. The British retreated first, and the Indians retreated on seeing the fate of their allies. The result of an affair against a body of

* Tecumseh (or Tecumthé) was a chief of the Shawnee tribe, and brother of the celebrated "Prophet," defeated by Harrison at the battle of Tippecanoe. He was the warm friend and ally of the English, and held the rank of Brigadier in the British army. He opposed the civilization of the Indians, but in a measure adopted the habits of the whites. He was a man of noble appearance, inflexible principle, honorable, and humane. He died at the early age of forty-four years.

such numerical superiority and under the most disadvantageous circumstances, may easily be anticipated. Closely pressed on every side, and chiefly by a strong corps of mounted riflemen, the troops were finally compelled to give way, and, completely hemmed in by their assailants, with the exception of fifty men who escaped through the wood, had no other alternative than to lay down their arms. The gallant Tecumseh fell in the fight. Proctor, with his personal staff, excellently mounted, sought safety in flight at the commencement of the engagement. (See page 71.)

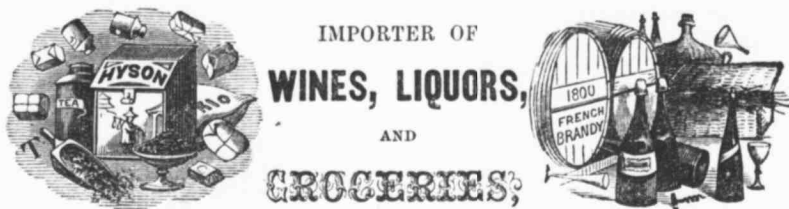

Dickison have an excellent factory for carding, dressing and fulling.

The religious denominations consist of an Episcopal, Roman Catholic, Wesleyan Methodist, Episcopal Methodist, and Baptist Churches. There is one school, with an average attendance of 65, pupils, H. D. Johnson teacher.

Arkona was first settled in 1832 by John Smith, and was first called Bosanquet. FROOMFIELD.

A saw and grist mills were built on the creek, a little south of the village, shortly after the village was laid out; but these have long since disappeared, and now the only business operation carried on in the place is a saw mill, owned by Mr. James Major. There are extensive wood docks at this place, and a large business in this line is annually done with the American steamers. There are also many staves and much timber annually exported. A little south of this village is what is called Stag Island, in the River St. Clair, containing about fifty acres, and affords a splendid retreat for pic-nic parties in the summer. Immediately north of Froomfield is the Indian reserve, which extends to the town of Sarnia.

OIL SPRINGS.

This important Village is situated in the Township of Enniskillen, on Black Creek, a tributary of the River Sydenham, distant from Wyoming, a station on the Sarnia branch of the G. W. R., 12 miles, from Petrolia, 7 miles, from Wallaceburgh twenty miles, and from Sarnia about 20 miles, the road to the County Town being planked and in excellent condition for the stages which daily traverse the distance. This road was opened in the year 1863. In the same year telegraphic communication was established, and in 1862, the "Oil Springs Chronicle," a paper devoted to the oil interest, was started by Messrs. Hudson & Solis; this excellent periodical is now under the management of Mr. John Smith. As the name indicates this village owes its rise, progress and prosperity to the Petroleum found in the locality. In another portion of the work reference is made to

the celebrated Shaw Well, which was tapped in January, 1862, which of itself was conducive to the fame of the village. Oil was observed in this locality years before its nature and value were understood, and in 1858, Mr. Williams, since President of the Canada Rock Oil Company, explored the region and found that Petroleum existed in inexhaustible quantities. In 1860, the village was laid out by Mr. J. M. Williams, James Thompson, W. E. Sanborn, and Hugh M. Shaw, since which time it has rapidly increased. The number of Oil wells now sunk is estimated at about 1500, some of which are pumped by steam. Wells, refineries and stills extend along the creeks for miles.

The village contains a number of well stocked stores, the merchants finding a ready market for their goods. There are a number of excellent hotels, the "Sherman," "Anglo American," and "Brantford House," being the most popular. All other branches of industry are ably represented here, and seem to be in a flourishing condition. The Churches are three in number, viz., Episcopal, Rev. Mr. Brookman; Wesleyan Methodist, Rev. Mr. Eastman; and Roman Catholic no resident minister. There is a Re-union Club for Literary and Musical Entertainments—F. A. Rea, President, and R. Matheson, Secretary. The Alexandra Masonic Lodge, No. 158, meets on Thursdays on or after full moon—Thos Ellison, W. M., D. McDonald, Secretary. Mails, Daily. Population, about 3000.
