LINCOLN COUNTY.

THIS County is bounded on the north by Lake Ontario; on the east by the Niagara river; on the south by Welland and Haldimand counties, and on the west by Wentworth county. It contains twelve municipalities, viz., the townships of Caistor, Clinton, Gainsborough, Grantham, Grimsby, Louth and Niagara; the town of Niagara; the villages of Grimsby, Merritton, and Port Dalhousie; and the city of St. Catharines.

The County is watered by numerous small creeks and streams, some of which afford ample water power for mills and factories. It is also admirably situated for agricultural purposes, the greater portion of it being elevated, on a high table land, having a limestone base with a good depth of soil above it; the surface is generally undulating, forming a succession of hill and dale. Being situated between two large bodies of water, lakes Erie and Ontario, it is less liable to suffer from late and early frosts than many other portions of the Province; hence it has long been celebrated as a fruit raising district.

The County is intersected by the main line of the Great Western Railway, which enters it on the west border, near Jordan Station, and passing through Louth and Grantham, passes out on the south line at Merritton; the Welland Railway, running from Port Dalhousie south and passing out at Merritton, on the south line; and the Niagara Division of the Canada Southern Railway, running from Niagara south to the International Bridge, and leaving the County on its south border near St. Davids. Through this County also runs the Welland Canal, that great work of engineering skill which has overcome the difficulty thrown in the way of the navigation of the great lakes by the Falls of Niagara.

The County of Lincoln originally formed part of the old Niagara District, which was comprised of the present counties of Lincoln, Haldimand and Welland. The Niagara District, in 1817, contained a population of 12,540 inhabitants; in 1824 the number had increased to 17,552; in 1834 to 27,347; in 1839 to 29,953; and in 1848 to 36,534.

The area of the County is 107,501 acres, with a population of 32,709.

TOWNSHIPS.

CAISTOR.

This township is bounded on the north by the townships of Grimsby and Saltfleet; on the east by Gainsborough; on the south by Canborough and Seneca, and on the west by Binbrook. It occupies the south-west corner of the County, and has an area of 32,837 acres, with a population of 1,907.

It is watered by the Chippawa or Welland River and its tributaries. The Twenty Mile Creek washes about five miles of the northern boundary. The surface is generally level, with a soil chiefly clay. It was originally timbered with pine, ash, beech, maple, elm, &c.

There are four post offices in the township, viz., Abingdon, Attercliffe, Caistorville and Warners.

Abingdon is a post village, a little west of the centre, 12 miles from Winona station, and 20 miles from Hamilton. It contains one church (Presb.), the township agricultural hall and fair grounds, a blacksmith shop, wagon shop, two stores, a saw and shingle mill and 50 inhabitants.

The Presbyterian church is a frame building, erected 10 or 12 years ago at a cost of \$600, and seats 200. Services are held every alternate Sabbath. Sunday school at 1 p. m. each Sabbath. Rev. Mr. Vincent, of Binbrook, officiates. There are about 30 members.

The Township Agricultural Hall is a frame building, 30x40, and was erected in 1874 at a cost of \$500. The Township Fair is held here annually.

The saw and shingle mill of Robert A. Shepherd has been established five years, employs five hands and cuts 200,000 feet of lumber and 450 bunches of shingles per annum.

Attercliffe is a post village in the south-east corner, on the Welland River, and is distant 24 miles from St. Catharines, and eight miles from Canfield station, on the G. T. R. The Canada Southern and G. W. R. Air Line roads pass a short distance from

the village. It contains two stores, a cheese factory, wagon shop, tailor shop, hotel, shoe shop, saw, shingle and planing mill, two blacksmith shops and 150 inhabitants.

Oswego Lodge, No. 166, I. O. O. F. was organized in 1874. Richard Ennis, N. G.; Douglas Roy, R. S.; meets every Thursday. There are 30 members.

The saw, shingle and planing mill of John W. Tisdale has been established five years, employs three men and turns out 500,000 feet of lumber and 500,000 shingles annually.

The Attercliffe Cheese Factory, of James Crowther, was established in 1878 and consumes the milk of 250 cows.

Caistor Centre is a hamlet about a mile and a half west of Abingdon and contains an M. E. church, a saw and shingle mill, a blacksmith shop and 40 inhabitants. It has no post office, the residents receiving their mail at Abingdon.

The M. E. church is a frame building, seating 200, and was erected in 1873. Services are held at 10.30 a. m. Sunday school at 9.30 a. m. Rev. Mr. Bristol, of Canboro, officiates.

The saw and shingle mill of Cicero Harris has been established 18 or 20 years, and employs four hands.

Caistorville is a post village in the south-west part, on the Chippawa river, eight miles from Canfield station, on the G. T. R., 30 miles from St. Catharines and 20 from Hamilton. It contains two churches (Canada Meth. and M. E.), a saw mill, blacksmith shop, hotel, shoe shop, wagon shop, harness shop, two stores, a cheese factory and 150 inhabitants.

The M. E. church is a frame building, seating 250, and was erected six or seven years ago. Services at 7.30 p. m. Rev. Mr. Adams, of Canboro, officiates.

The Canada Methodist church is a frame building, seating 200. It was erected 20 years ago and is valued at \$1000 including lot. Services at 2.30 p. m. Sunday school at 9 a. m. Prayer meeting Wednesday evening. There are 112 members.

L. O. L. No. 283, was organized 28 or 30 years ago. Joseph McCarter, W. M.; Andrew Pearson, Sec. Meets Wednesday on or before full moon. There are 30 members.

Royal Black Preceptory of Ireland, No. 419, was organized in 1876. Joseph McCarter, W. M.; Andrew Pearson, Registrar. Meets second Tuesday in each month. There are 12 members.

Warners is a post village in the south-east part, and contains a store, hotel, blacksmith shop, tin shop and 40 or 50 inhabitants.

Caistor Corners L. O. L. No. 1172, was organized in 1874, John D. Servos, W. M.; Edmund Lymburner, Sec. Meets Friday on or before full moon. There are 30 members.

The first settler in the township was a negro named Diamond, who settled near the banks of the Welland River in 1778. In 1782 he sold his improvements to Henry Dochstader, an U. E. Loyalist, from New York, whose descendants own the same spot of ground to the present time. The Dochstader family were the first white settlers in the township. In 1794-5-6 John, James, Alexander and Mathew Lymburner settled in the township. In 1817 the township contained 156 inhabitants, one grist and four saw mills. In 1850 it contained 1,047 inhabitants, one grist and five saw mills. Caleb Travis, one of the early settlers, was the father of 24 children, no triplets, and only one pair of twins.

The following information in regard to the early settlers of this township we extract from Page's Atlas of Lincoln and Welland counties.

"Rev. Henry Ryan [an early pioneer] possessed great physical strength. The following are some of the many anecdotes which are told of him:

"Once when paying an Indian for some venison, some time during the war of 1812-15, the money happened to be a piece with the American Eagle on it. The Indian on seeing it yelled, Yankee! Yankee! and with a drawn knife sprang upon Ryan. But quick as a flash, he found himself upon the ground disarmed, and held by Ryan as in a vice. Being compelled to surrender unconditionally, he was ever after, according to his promise then made, Ryan's faithful friend. Ryan was the superintendent of the Methodist Church in the Province during the war. In the spring of 1819, Ryan, Smith and Morse, all removed to the neighborhood of Smithville; and shortly after Ryan and Smith each were prosecuted for marrying. Sentence of banishment for 15 years was passed upon Ryan, which was subsequently revoked; Smith pleaded his own case at the trial, and by his eloquence and ability received an acquittal.

"John Lymburner built the first saw mill, in 1799, on lot No. 6, con. 2, on Moore's creek. The first school house was built of logs, in 1816, on lot No. 2, con. 1; first teacher,—Wilson, known afterwards in the newspapers as 'Nappertandy.' The first white male child born in the township, in the spring of 1819, was the late Jacob Lymburner, son of Matthew Lymburner; and the first

white female child born near the same time, in the township, was Llanah Dochstader, daughter of Joseph Dochstader.

"The early settlers suffered many hardships. Provisions had frequently to be carried on the back from Niagara, along Indian paths, from thirty to forty miles. Sheep and other tender animals, if kept at all, were shut up at night in stables or pens so high and tight, that no wolf or bear could enter. The howling of wolves was nearly as familiar as the crowing of fowls now. Families made their own cloth and garments of flax and wool. Farmers made their own sleighs, cradles, rakes and wooden pitchforks; many of them made their own boots and shoes; and some tanned their own leather. Matrons as well as maidens, would walk ten or twelve miles, with a pail of butter on each arm, to Griffin's store, and return in time to milk the cows."

CLINTON.

This township is bounded on the north by Lake Ontario; on the east by the townships of Louth and Pelham; on the south by Gainsborough, and on the west by Grimsby. It has an area of 25,461 acres, and a population of 2,601.

It is watered by the Twenty Mile, Thirty Mile, Mud, Konkle's and Red Creeks, and other small streams.

"The general face of the township is in easy gentle slopes or moderately rolling, except Mount Dorchester, which is more or less hilly and irregular, and in some places too steep and precipitous for cultivation. The quality of the soil is excellent, yet variable, being composed of sand, sandy loam, clay loam and clay; a large portion of the land on the mountain rests on a limestone base. The whole township is fertile and productive, being well adapted to agriculture and horticulture. At the base of the mountain, some two or three miles south-east of the village of Beamsville, is the curiosity of what is called an 'ice spring,' where ice is found during the greatest heat of summer, but none in the winter. Salina Springs along the 30 Mile Creek were once worked in making salt, but have been abandoned since the war. A lead mine in the western part of the township, about 3 miles from Smithville, was worked about 30 years ago, (the Government appropriating a few hundred dollars to assist it,) but the metal was not obtained in sufficient quantities to be remunerative. The township was finely timbered, principally with oak and pine, but has other varieties

such as beech, maple, elm, ash, hickory, ironwood, and in some parts black walnut, butternut and chestnut."*

The main line of the Great Western Railway passes through the north part from east to west.

There are three post offices in the township, viz., Beamsville, Camptden and Tintern.

Beamsville is a post village in the north-west part, distant from St. Catharines 12 miles and from Hamilton 23 miles. It is also a station on the Great Western Railway. It contains three churches (Presb., Bap. and Meth.), three general stores, two carriage shops, two cooper shops, two shoe stores, a foundry, two harness shops, three hotels, a jewelery shop, four blacksmith shops, a stove and tinware shop, two cabinet shops, a paint shop, two flour and feed stores, two tailor shops, a saw and shingle mill, a manufactory of barley forks and horse rakes, a drug store, confectionery store, two butcher shops, a book store, bakery, and a population of 600.

The Methodist church is a frame building. Services at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. Sunday school at 9.30 a.m. Prayer meeting, Tuesday. Rev. Mr. Hawkins, pastor.

The Baptist church is a brick building, seating 500. It was erected in 1857 at a cost of \$6,600. Services at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. Sunday school at 9.30 a.m. Prayer meeting, Wednesday. The number of members is 254. Rev. Ebenezer Hooper, pastor.

Prince of Wales L. O. L. No. 1333, was organized about 1871. Jacob Book, W. M.; Frank B. Rodgers, Sec. Meets third Wednesday in each month. There are 60 members.

Boles Lodge, O. Y. B., No. 128, was organized in August 1877. W. A. Vosburgh, W. M.; Milton Zimmerman, Sec. Meets first Thursday in each month. There are 42 members.

Ivy Lodge, A. F. and A. M., No. 115, was instituted about 40 years ago. James Allan, W. M.; Geo. Walker, Sec. Meets Tuesday on or after full moon. There are 90 members.

There is also a Grange order here.

The agricultural implement manufactory of James Bradt was established about 20 years ago and employs five or six hands.

The manufactory of J. B. McKay has been established 12 years. Four or five hands are employed in the manufacture of 400,000 feet of lumber, 500 squares of shingles, 400 barley forks and 400 horse rakes annually.

The carriage manufactory of J. D. Bennett was established in 1870 and employs from 16 to 20 men turning out from \$12,000 to \$15,000 worth of work annually.

The carriage manufactory of Wm. Kew & Son was established in 1840, and employs 10 men, turning out \$12,000 worth of work annually.

The village was named after the late Jacob Beam, Esq., one of the first settlers.

About two miles east of the village, on the brow of the mountain, have lately been opened some large quarries of excellent building stone, which are being extensively worked and employ a large force of men.

Campden is a post village on the 6th and 7th concessions, a little east of the centre. It is distant four miles from Beamsville, 12 from St. Catharines, and 25 from Hamilton. It contains one church (Evangelical Association), two shoe shops, two blacksmith shops, a tailor shop, carriage shop, two stores, a paint shop, sash, door and blind factory, butcher shop, hotel, and 200 inhabitants.

The Church of the Evangelical Association is a brick building, seating 400. It was erected in 1871, at a cost of \$3,000. Services at 9.30 a. m. and 7.30 p. m. Sunday school at 11 a. m. Bible class on Monday evening. Rev. S. L. Umbach, pastor.

Campden Temple, No. 320, I. O. G. T. was re-organized in 1875. Franklin Houser, W. C.; H. S. Moyer, Sec. Meets Fridays. There are 35 members.

Tintern is a post village in the south-east part, on the 9th and 10th concessions. It contains a Methodist church, tailor shop, blacksmith shop, store, wagon shop, shoe shop, and 50 inhabitants.

The Methodist church is a frame building, seating 300. It was erected in 1874 at a cost of \$1,600. Services at 3 p. m. Sunday school at 2 p. m. Prayer meeting on Wednesday. Rev. Mr. Hawkins, of Beamsville, officiates.

Union Gem Temple, No. 107, I. O. G. T. was organized in March, 1877. Henry Johnson, W. C. Meets Saturdays. There are 60 members.

"One of the first settlers was William Walker, a Loyalist from Virginia, who with his six sons and four daughters came to the township in 1780 when in its wildest state. All his sons except Thomas afterward went further west. About the same time and soon after came the Henrys, Tuffords, Culps, Konkles, Berrindger, Buchner, Corwin, Marlett, Clouse, Zimmerman, Adair, Hare,

Overholt, Shultz, House, Hawn, and others, all in the northern part below the mountain, commencing in 1788-9. Along Mud Creek and the 20 were the Books, Teeter, Linderberry, Freese, Zimmerman, Dawdy, Hitchcock, Bartram, Dennis, Johnsons, Cohoe, from N. York and N. Jersey. In 1799, Albright and several of the Mayers, who in 1800-1-2 and following years were followed by the Grobbs, Hipplés, Hunsbergers, Wisimers, and other Germans from Bucks Co., Pennsylvania."*

The first grist mill was built by Cohoe in 1790, on the Jordan, where Dean's mills now stand. A saw and grist mill was built shortly after by a Mr. Dawdy, on lot No. 1, concession 8. The first school house, used also for religious purposes, was built in 1790, where Beamsville now stands. The first church was built by the Baptists, in 1776, on the present site of Beamsville. Rev. Wm. Holmes was the first resident minister. He preached the first sermon at the house of Staats Overholt, on lot 16, Broken Front, in 1782-3. The place where the house then stood is now some 20 rods in the lake, so great has been the encroachment of the lake upon the land in many places.

In 1835 the township contained 1,779 inhabitants. In 1850 the population had increased to 2,652.

GAINSBOROUGH.

This township is bounded on the north by the townships of Clinton and Grimsby; on the east by Pelham; on the south by Wainfleet, and on the west by Caistor. It has an area of 89,699 acres, and a population of 2,722.

"The land is, as a whole, gently rolling; along the large streams, quite rolling, and in the centre, more level. Several small streams, the largest, the Big Beaver, empty into the Welland River, on the south; and North's creek empties into the 20 Mile creek, on the north. The 16 Mile creek runs through two thirds of the township. The 20 Mile creek ends on lot No. 30, on the north side, running eastwardly some seven miles, where it runs into the township of Clinton. The soil is generally clay and clay loam; along the Welland and the 20 Mile creek, the flats are a rich alluvial. It has been a well timbered township; mostly pine with a large proportion of oak, beech, maple, basswood, ash, elm, hickory and ironwood. The Welland or 'Chippaws' (People without moccasins)

is deep, and on a level with the waters of the Niagara River at its mouth; for when the westerly winds drive the waters of Lake Erie sufficient to swell the waters of Niagara, the waters of the Welland flow up stream sometimes for several hours, the distance of thirty miles, and raising the stream from one to two feet high. Immense quantities of timber are floated down this stream from Caistor, and other places annually. Steam tugboats go nearly as far up the stream as the western boundary of the Township, generally understood as the 'Deep Water' termination."

There are six post offices in the township, viz, Bismarck, Candasville, Elcho, Rosedene, St. Anns and Wellandport,

Bismarck is a post office near the centre.

Candasville is a post village near the south-east corner, on the Welland River, about four miles from Perry Station on the C. S. R. It contains a saw mill, cabinet shop, blacksmith shop, two stores, a butcher shop and 100 inhabitants.

Elcho is a post village in the south-west part, containing an United Brethren Church, a store, blacksmith shop and 50 inhabitants.

The United Brethren Church. Services at 2.30 p. m. Sunday school at 9.30 a. m. Prayer meeting on Wednesday. Rev. James Cornell, pastor.

Rosedene is a post office in the north-east part, 10 miles from Beamsville.

St. Anns is a post village on the Jordan River, north of the centre, and near the north line. It is distant 11 miles from Grimsby, and 16 from St. Catharines. It contains a Presbyterian Church, carriage shop, store, tannery, grist and saw mill, shoe store, two blacksmith shops and 125 inhabitants.

The Presbyterian Church. Services at 11 a. m. Sunday school at 9 a. m. Rev. James Fraser.

Maple Leaf Temple, No. 389, I.O.G.T. Meets Fridays. There are 75 members.

St. Anns L.O.L., No. 1267. Meets Thursday on or before full moon. There are 30 members.

The St. Anns Grist Mill has three runs of stones, with a capacity of 400 bushels per 24 hours. Robert Kerr.

St. Anns was originally known as "Snyder's Mills," a Mr. Snyder having erected mills there in 1794.

Wellandport is a thriving post village, handsomely situated, on the Welland River, at the head of navigation. It is distant 18 miles from St. Catharines and two and a half miles from Wellandport station, on the Canada Southern Railway. Four mails are received and dispatched daily by train and stage. It contains a Presbyterian Church, three carriage shops, four blacksmith shops, two harness shops, two butcher shops, a drug store, three general stores, two hotels, a grist mill, three shoe shops, a tailor shop, bakery, and 250 inhabitants.

The Presbyterian Church. Services at 3 p. m. Sunday school at 2 p. m. There are 140 members. Rev. James Frazer, of St. Anns, officiates.

Dufferin Lodge, No. 338, A.F. and A.M. was instituted in 1875. John E. Cohoe, W.M.; W. H. Dawdy, Sec. Meets Tuesday on or before full moon. There are 18 members.

The County Orange Lodge meets at Orange Hall, Wellandport, in February and June. Alex. Makeague, County Master; C. L. Snyder, St. Anns, Sec.

Wellandport L.O.L. No. 1103, was organized May 27, 1861. Geo. Steward, W.M.; J. W. Johnston, Sec. Meets Wednesday on or before full moon. There are 40 members.

Monck Lodge, No. 105, O.Y.B. was organized in October, 1876. Joseph Steward, W.M.; Wm. Steward, Sec. An excellent brass band is maintained in connection with this Lodge under the leadership of Joseph Steward. The Lodge meets on the first and third Saturdays. There are 40 members.

Excelsior Lodge, No. 895, I.O.G.T. was organized March 1st, 1876. Andrew Simpson, W.C.; James Rae, Sec. Meets Thursdays. There are 50 members.

The Wellandport Mills (grist) were established in June, 1878. There are two runs of stones, with a capacity of 300 bushels per day. The motive power is steam.

A commodious public hall has recently been erected by Walter Misner.

Wellandport was originally known as "The Narrows," so called from a narrow strip of land which here divides the Big Beaver Creek from the Welland River. A mill was erected here in 1816, the first in the south part of the township. The Big Beaver was dammed, and a race made through the village by which the water from the mill wheel was discharged into the Welland.

The first settlement of this township was made along the Welland River, in the south, and the Jordan in the north. Among

the first settlers was John Dochstader, in 1782, at the south-west angle of the township, who was followed by the Hodges, Dils, McDowell, John Barker, Philip Henry, the Robins, Heaslips and others. Most of the first settlers passed to their new homes in canoes from the mouth of the Welland at Niagara River.

The first school house in the south part was built at Wm. Dils' lane, one mile west of Wellandport, the first teacher being — Wilson, *alias* "Nappertandy." The first school house in the north part was built of logs in 1798. The first church was built of logs in 1799, on lot 19 in the sixth concession, by the Presbyterians. The first resident minister was Rev. H. Ryan, in 1809. The first mill was erected at St. Anns in 1794 by a Mr. Snyder.

"In 1788-9, occurred a scarcity of provisions, (at the end of the three years that Government furnished the settlers,) known as the 'Hungry year.' The cry for 'bread! bread!' could not be met; great suffering prevailed throughout the country, many people were compelled to live on roots, the buds and bark of trees, and occasionally game; but ammunition was very scarce, and money to buy it still more so.

"In 1796, a sweeping tornado, generally known as *The Hurricane*, passed through the entire length of the Province, and in the northern parts of Caistor, Gainsborough and Pelham, mowed a swarth of timber from one and a half to two miles wide. In those days, the inhabitants had sometimes their own mills; perhaps a stump or block of wood so hollowed out that the grain was pounded in it sufficiently to make 'horning' or 'mush,' hence they were called 'horning blocks.' Sometimes the exploring settler would run through the forest, until he found some favorite spot for his future home; some of them before chain or compass had entered the Township."*

In 1835 the township contained 1,543 inhabitants. In 1850 the population had increased to 2,133.

GRANTHAM.

This township is bounded on the north by Lake Ontario; on the east by the township of Niagara and a portion of Thorold and Stamford; on the south by Stamford and Thorold, and on the west by Louth. It has an area of 18,835 acres, and a population of 1,951.

The land is generally level, and the soil loam, varying in its consistence.

The old and new Welland Canals pass through the township, from Merriton on the south line, intersecting St. Catharines, to Port Dalhousie, on Lake Ontario. The Great Western Railway crosses the township in the south-west part. The Welland Railway enters the township at Merriton, on the south line, and passing through St. Catharines, continues to Port Dalhousie, its northern terminus.

There are four post offices in the township, viz., Homer, Merriton, Port Dalhousie and St. Catharines.

Homer is a post village on the Ten Mile Creek, three miles from St. Catharines. It contains two churches (Epis. and Meth), two hotels, a store, two blacksmith shops, two carriage shops, and 150 inhabitants. There is an excellent horse training course here owned by Mr. Thos. Brown.

The Methodist Church. Services at 2 p. m. Sunday school at 11 a. m. Rev. Mr. Reid, of Merriton, officiates.

The Episcopal Church. Services at 3 p. m. Sunday school at 2 p. m. Rev. Mr. Fennell, of Merriton, officiates.

Merriton, named after the Hon. William Hamilton Merrit, is an incorporated village on the Welland Canal, on the south line of the township, three miles from St. Catharines. It is also a station on the Great Western and Welland Railways. The excellent water privilege here afforded by the waste water from the Welland Canal has been utilized to, a large extent by the erection of a considerable number of manufacturing establishments, employing a large force of operatives. The facilities for shipment to all parts of the country by rail and canal are also unexcelled. The population of the village is about 1,800.

The Merriton Cotton Mills employ 100 hands in the manufacture of cotton bags, warps, yarns, twines, battings, waddings, colored shirtings, &c. King & Dolan, proprietors.

The Lybster Cotton Manufacturing Co. employs 200 hands in the manufacture of sheetings, shirtings, tickings, denims, cotton yarns, &c.

The Merriton Paper Mills employ 135 to 150 hands in the manufacture of newspaper, paper bags and wrapping paper.

The Lincoln Paper Mill Co, was incorporated last year (1878). An extensive stone building has been erected, and it is intended to

employ a large force of operatives in the manufacture of manilla paper, paper sacks, newspaper &c.

The Canada Wheel Works employ 30 hands in the manufacture of carriage and wagon wood work to the amount of \$50,000 per annum. H. Patterson & Co., proprietors.

The saw mill of N. & O. J. Phelps employs 35 men in the manufacture of lumber, lath, shingles, and building materials generally.

The saw mill of McCleary & McLean has been established 25 years, and employs from 18 to 20 hands in the manufacture of lumber, flooring, siding, shingles and lath.

The St. Catharines Biscuit Works employ 11 hands. Girvin & Cook, proprietors.

The Merritton Flouring Mills have two runs of stones with a capacity of 50 barrels a day. W. B. Smyth, proprietor.

The furniture manufactory of Michael Urlocker employs four or five men.

The Merritton Wooden Mills employ 21 hands. Nelson Haight, proprietor.

L.O.L. No. 77, meets the first Monday of each month. There are 42 members.

Defiance L.O.L. No. 844, meets the second Monday in each month. There are 42 members.

Johnson Lodge of True Blues, meets the third Wednesday of each month. There are 46 members.

Afton Temple, No. 820, I.O.G.T., meets Fridays; there are 45 members.

The Presbyterian Church. Services at 3 p. m. Sunday school at 10.30 a. m. Prayer meeting on Wednesday. There are 40 members. Rev. Mr. Eastman, of St. Catharines, officiates.

The Methodist Church. Services at 7 p. m. Sunday school at 2 p. m. Prayer meeting on Wednesday. There are 160 members. Rev. Thos. J. Reid, pastor. This society also have a mission church near lock 9. Services at 10.30 a. m. Sunday school at 2.30 p. m. Prayer meeting on Thursday.

St. Patrick's Church. Mass at 9 a. m. Vespers at 3 p. m. Sunday school at 2 p. m. Rev. Mr. Sullivan, of Thorold, officiates.

Port Dalhousie, an incorporated village, is situated on Lake Ontario, in the north-west corner of the township, at the mouth of the Twelve Mile Creek, distant from St. Catharines four miles, and from Toronto 31 miles by water, and 76 by rail. The Welland Canal here empties its waters into the lake. This is also the northern terminus of the Welland Railway, which here has a large ele-

vator with a storage capacity of 100,000 bushels. The water power afforded by the canal has been utilized to some extent by the erection of a number of mills and manufactories. A good ship yard is located here which, in prosperous times, employs a large force of men. The harbour is safe and commodious, and here vessels may find refuge in all seasons. During the season of navigation daily communication is had with Toronto by steamboat, running in connection with the Welland Railway. The population of the village numbers 916.

The Ontario Mills (flouring) have four runs of stones, with a capacity of 150 barrels per day. Sylvester Neelon, proprietor.

The Port Dalhousie Mills (flouring) have three runs of stones with a capacity of 150 barrels a day. John Lawrie & Co., proprietors.

The Presbyterian Church. Services at 2.30 p. m. Sunday school at 10 a. m. Bible class at 7.30 p. m. Prayer meeting on Thursday. There are 45 members. Rev. John Porteous, pastor.

St. Johns Church (Epis). Services at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. Sunday school at 9.30 a. m. Rev. John Gribble, pastor.

Lincoln Temple, No. 413, I.O.G.T., meets Tuesdays. There are 53 members.

Seymour Lodge, A.F. & A.M. meets Wednesday on or before full moon. There are 60 members.

The village was settled about the year 1776, and originally laid out by Mr. N. Pawling. It was named after Lord Dalhousie, in gratitude for his exertions in behalf of the Welland Canal. The post office was established in 1830.

Reynoldsville is a small village two miles from St. Catharines, at the base of the mountain, in the south-west corner of the township. It contains a wood pulp mill, saw mill, wagon and blacksmith shop, a manufactory of wall brackets, and 50 inhabitants. There is no post office, the residents receiving their mail at St. Catharines.

Decew Falls is located a short distance from the village, where it falls over the mountain, the stream thence passing through a deep gorge or ravine, forming a scene of magnificence and grandeur which the lover of nature cannot fail to appreciate. On the brow of the mountain is located the reservoir of the St. Catharines Water Works.

The saw mill of B. F. Reynolds employs six men, turning out 200,000 feet of lumber per annum.
