## ARKONA.

An incorporated village composed of part of the Townships of Bosanquet and Warwick; distant from Sarnia 34 miles; from Widder on the G. T. R., 7 miles; and 12 miles from Watford station on the G. W. R. It took its place this year among the municipalities of the County, and being placed in the midst of an excellent agricultural district, will ere long, become an important centre of trade and business. ## FOREST.

Is one of the most important villages in western Ontario, and station on the G. T. R., 22 miles from Sarnia. It was incorporated in 1872, and since that time has progressed so rapidly that it is now a leading centre of trade and manufacture, with a population of 1,300. There are the extensive saw mills, etc., of Coultis Brothers; two flouring mills, three planing mills, etc.

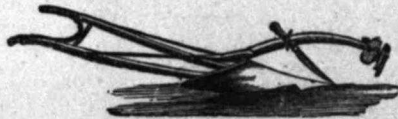

### WALLACEBURG.

An incorporated village in the County of Kent, bordering on Lambton, with a population of 1,200.
