PUBLISHER'S NOTICE.

THE compilation of this the first Directory of the City of Kingston and its environs, has been attended with a good deal of trouble and labor. It may still be imperfect, but the publisher hopes in the next edition to correct all errors and omissions.

INTRODUCTION.

To this, the first Directory of the old city of Cataraqui, it may not be inapplicable to prefix a few brief remarks concerning its antecedents and present status.

Kingston is beautifully situated in a nearly land-locked bay, at a point where Lake Ontario merges into the majestic St. Lawrence. The view of the city and surrounding scenery is not surpassed by the approaches to any other city in America. A few miles above Kingston, the waters of Lake Ontario are divided by the first of the long series of islands so well known to tourists as the "Thousand Islands," of which Simcoe and Wolfe Islands, opposite the city, may be looked upon as strongholds, designed by nature to withstand the encroaches of the waves of Ontario. A considerable body of water pours to the South, forming what is called the "American Channel," passing Cape Vincent, French Creek, Alexandria Bay, &c., being the channel which the American steamers generally follow on their upward and downward routes. By far the greater body of water, however, follows the North or Canada channel, the usual course of British American vessels.

On approaching from the West, the first object that attracts the traveller's attention, is Fort Henry, with the naval station of Fort Frederick at its base, and its attendant battlements, fortifications, towers and redoubts. Fort Henry is a favorite resort of visitors, and its elevated position affords the best view that can be had of the city. By the courtesy of the Town Major, visitors can always obtain tickets of admission.

Kingston is the capital of the united counties of Frontenac, Lennox, and Addington, and sends one member to Parliament. Its present Representative, Hon. John A. Macdonald, Attorney General for Canada West, has represented the city for many years. It was for some time the capital of the United Provinces, under the administrations of Lord Sydenham, Sir Charles Bagot, and Sir Charles Metcalfe. The removal of the Government offices caused a serious depression for some years in the growth and prosperity of the city, but happily the citizens now depend more upon self-exertion. The result is seen in the many new and splendid buildings in different parts of the city, and the extensive manufactories of different kinds that have sprung up within the last few years.

Kingston being situated at the junction of lake and river navigation, and being the outlet of the productions of the fertile Bay of Quinte, and also connecting with the city of Ottawa and intermediate country by the Rideau Canal, naturally enjoys a considerable shipping and commercial trade. Till the opening of the Rome and Cape Vincent Railroad in 1853, the forwarding trade was the principal business; since that time the facilities of transport from the seaboard will probably afford an impetus to more purely commercial business. In 1854, during the season of navigation, the inward and outward tonnage, by steam and sail vessels, was as follows:

The population of Kingston and liberties, including the military, is about 15,000.

There are in the city 15 churches of various denominations, viz: 3 Episcopal, 3 Presbyterian, 4 Methodist, 1 Baptist, 2 Roman Catholic, 1 Congregational, and 1 Bible Christian.

The educational institutions are:—Queen's College (Presbyterian), College of Regiopolis (Roman Catholic); Grammar School, Queen's College Preparatory School, and the Common Schools.

The Provincial Penitentiary is also located here, the convicts in which are all employed in various branches of manufacture. This, it was at one time feared, would operate injuriously against the artizans of the city, but, under judicious management, it has not had that tendency.

Among the public buildings may be noticed the City Hall, one of the finest and most substantial edifices in Canada; it is of cut limestone, (a building material for which Kingston is famous,) and cost \$92,000. It contains all the public offices of the city, including a spacious city hall, capable of seating over 1000 persons. The whole is surmounted by a handsome cupola, from which, on a clear day, an extensive view of the city and surrounding country may be obtained.

The Court House is a large stone building, but not suiting the improved condition of the city, it is about to be removed, and another more in accordance with the times, is to be erected on a site further from the centre of the city, and its present site occupied by a Custom House and Post Office.

The Commercial Bank has lately erected a new and spacious banking house, which together with the Bank of Montreal immediately opposite, presents a special attraction to strangers. The Bank of British North America has its offices in the City Buildings. The Bank of Upper Canada occupies an unpretending edifice in the lower part of the city, as does also the Trust and Loan Company. These form the monetary institutions of the city.

There are three daily papers published in the city, viz:—the “Daily News,” “British Whig,” and “Morning Herald.” There are also three weekly newspapers published in Kingston,

viz: "Chronicle and News," Weekly Whig," and "Commercial Advertiser."

There are five foundries in the city where steam engines of every size and of great excellence, are manufactured.

Among the different manufacturing establishments of the city, Morton's Brewery and Distillery, the most extensive in the Province, is deserving of especial notice. This establishment consumes about 200,000 bushels of grain annually, and gives employment to a vast number of men in different capacities, between sixty and seventy families deriving their subsistence directly from it, besides the ready market it affords the farmer for an immense quantity of coarse grain.

There are also a number of excellent hotels and inns in the city, where travellers will meet with every kindness and attention that can be desired. Among them may be mentioned the British American, Irons' Exchange, Stenson's City, and the British Empire Hotels.

The rateable property in the City last year amounted to £75,955, and such is now the increasing prosperity of the city that lots have nearly doubled their value within the past year, and in many instances have trebled.

Stages run westward daily in various directions, and eastward six times a week during the season of closed navigation.

The Grand Trunk Railroad is now progressing as fast as circumstances will permit, and as its depot will be within a short distance from the city, with a branch leading thereto, its completion will afford greatly increased facilities for travel.

For some time past great exertions have been made to open up the fertile country in rear of the city to the north and north-east by means of good Macadamized roads, several of which are now in course of construction, and when completed will prove a mutual benefit to the citizens and to the inhabitants of the back Townships through which they pass. The Perth, Phillipsville, Pittsburgh to Gananoque, one to Storrington, and another to Bath, have been completed, and pay on an average twelve per cent.

The Kingston Marine Railway is the property of a Company incorporated by the Legislature, carrying on extensively the business of ship-building, both for inland and ocean navigation. This Railway hauls out for repair the largest class of both steam and sailing vessels. The machinery is propelled by an engine of thirty horse power. During the year just ending, by the enterprise of private individuals, several splendid sea-going vessels have been built at this port which have found a ready and profitable market in Europe.


In Portsmouth, a village a short distance from the city, there is another marine railway, under the superintendence of Mr John Ault, where two beautiful steamers, the Banshee and Bowmanville, were built during the past year, several schooners, &c.

* When the new Kingston and Perth Road is completed this distance will be shortened to about 50 miles.

† A railway is in active operation between Prescott and Ottawa.

‡ Travellers can either proceed by land to Cobourg, and thence take the steamer to Toronto, &c., or they can take the steamer up the beautiful Bay of Quinte to Belleville or Trenton, and there take the stage to Cobourg.

§ By this route the distance to New York city is reduced to sixteen hours travel.
