





ORANGEVILLE.—The Village of Orangeville owes its existence to Orange Lawrence, who about the year 1846 bought the land on which it stands from Robert Huston, one of the sons of Abraham Huston, the pioneer settler in Amaranth. There was about five acres

of land cleared when Mr. Lawrence bought the property, and an old saw-mill stood on the lot—the nucleus it might be said of the future village. Orangeville has gradually risen in importance, and is now a smart thriving place of about 1000 inhabitants. One part of it lay in the Township of Mono, in the County of Simcoe, and the other in Garafraxa, in the County of Wellington; but when it was incorporated, in 1864, it was annexed to this county, and is now wholly separated from the County of Simcoe as far as Municipal affairs are concerned. The large and fine agricultural district every year growing into more importance, and its favorable geographical position—at the convergence of the three counties of Wellington, Simcoe and Peel—have contributed, doubtless, very much to its rapid growth. It is beautifully situated on a handsome slope on the town lines running east and west between Amaranth and Mono on the one side, and Caledon and Garafraxa on the other. A small stream runs through the village, joining the Credit a little below, having in a short distance the great fall of 120 feet, and driving in its course a woollen factory, a grist mill, and two saw mills. There are quite a number of stores in the village besides other places of business and mechanics' shops. It is forty miles from Toronto, and thirty-six from Guelph. The construction of a tramway from the village to Brampton has been agitated for some time past, and its projectors are sanguine of ultimate success, though appearances are rather against it for the present. The value of real property as returned by the assessor for this year is \$49,590.

Orangeville contains an excellent grammar school, C. R. Dickinson, M.A., principal; also a common school, J. Berwick and Miss M. Bennett, teachers. Population about 1200.

SALEM—(WYDNFORD P. O.) A village beautifully situated on the Irvine, in the township of Nichol, and on the Saugeen and Elora roads, distant from Elora about one mile, and from Guelph thirteen. The village was founded in 1845, by the late Sem Wissler, Esq., and has rapidly increased in importance, having at the present time a population of about six hundred. The post office was established in 1863—Sem Wissler, first postmaster. The village contains two grist mills, a flax mill, saw mill, tannery, brewery, woollen and last factories, foundry and agricultural works, two general stores, four hotels, &c. There are three good schools and a Wesleyan Methodist Church. Elora and Salem may be considered as the central points among the best water privileges in Canada; within an area of about three miles there are eighteen, averaging eighteen feet fall. Several of them are not yet appropriated.

SALEM MILLS (flouring), Jacob B. Eby, proprietor; water power; four run of stones; capacity about 10,000 barrels during the season, in addition to a large amount of custom work.

IRVINE MILLS (flouring and oatmeal) John R. Wissler, proprietor, manufacture annually 12,000 barrels of flour and 3000 barrels of meal, for exportation, besides a large quantity for custom and local use.

WISSLER'S TANNERY, John R. Wissler, proprietor. All kinds of leather manufactured. Capacity, 5000 hides, 2000 sheepskins, and 2000 calfskins. The proprietor obtained *eighteen prizes* for leather at the last Provincial Exhibition held in Toronto, 1866. In connection a shoe shop, turning out about 2000 pairs annually.

IRVINE FOUNDRY, Modeland's Agricultural Works, Isaac Modeland, proprietor. This extensive establishment employs from fifteen to twenty hands. The building is of stone, 100 feet by 30. All kinds of agricultural implements are manufactured; threshing, mowing and reaping machines, steel mould board ploughs, cultivators, &c.

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
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
